AN ILLIBERAL PROCEEDING.

Canada is generally supposed to be a country where freedom of speech within legitimate bounds is allowed to every man. Canadians who have been in the habit of making this boast will be interested to learn that Premier Mowatt of Ontario does not concede to every man this right. It appears that Mr. Elgin Myers, crown attorney for the county of Dufferin, has given the subject of the future of Canada deep and serious consideration, and has arrived at the conclusion that political union with the United States is the ultimate destiny of Canada.

THE PRESIDENTIAL CONTEST.

The proceedings in the Democratic convention in Chicago last week resulted in the nomination of Grover Cleveland of New York for the presidency. General Stevenson, of Illinois, an old Federal soldier, was given the second place on the ticket. Now that both parties have selected their candidates, the battle may be said to have fairly begun, and from now until after the election in November political excitement in the United States will run high.

It will be seen from these tables that the Republicans start out with 157 sure votes, and the Democrats with 153. New York with its 36 votes is in every election a doubtful state. In 1884 it went Democratic by a plurality of about one thousand, but in 1888 it gave the Republicans a large plurality. In the last state election Flower, Democrat, was elected governor by an overwhelming majority. Indiana is also a very uncertain state. Cleveland carried it in 1884 and Harrison in 1888. Two years later it gave the state Democratic ticket a majority of over 20,000.

President Harrison has fired the first gun in the presidential campaign by threatening retaliation against Canada for its alleged discrimination against the United States in the matter of canal tolls. American vessels have been given by treaty the right to navigate our canals, while Canadians have been given no such right on American canals.

Mr. Blake has sailed for the United Kingdom to take part in the struggle which has already begun between the friends and enemies of Irish Home Rule. He has been assigned the seat in South Langford, in the province of Leinster. At the last general election, this constituency returned a Nationalist by a practically unanimous vote.

The news from Africa that Emin Pasha is not dead as reported has led many to hope that the report of the death of Captain Stairs may also prove untrue. Travellers in Africa are very often delayed where no tidings of their whereabouts can be made known to the outside world.

The nomination of Jacob Whitelaw Reid as Republican candidate for the vice-presidency is said to be a concession to the labor element. He was recently minister to France and the rent of the house in which he lived there amounted to more than his salary.

H. M. Stanley, the African explorer, is the Unionist candidate for the Commons in North Lambert. His reception there was calculated to make him wish himself again in wilds of Africa. The Radical element had complete control of the meeting and despite the presence of Mr Stanley he had great difficulty in securing a hearing.

Miss Bell Hudson is visiting her cousin Miss S. Walker. Miss Walker has been ill since last fall, but we are glad to see that she is improving, being able to go to church and Sunday school last Sunday.

We have started at the hall a Christian Endeavor Society, twelve active and four associate members joining the first meeting.
