
SUPREME COURT OF N. B.-Doe dem Girvan vs. McLean. This was a motion for a new trial, and the chief ground relied on was that a copy of the deed of the land in question was improperly admitted in evidence, as the notice required by the act of the plaintiff's intention to give such copy in evidence was insufficient, being served only four days before the opening of the circuit, though more than six days bofore the trial of the case. The question at issue was to whether the six days' notice which is required by the act relates to the opening of the court or the trial of the case. The court divided, the Chief Justice and Justices Tuck and Fraser holding that the act intended six days before the opening of the court, and Justices Palmer, King and Hannington holding that six days before the trial of the case was the meaning of the act. The motion for the new trial was therefore refused.
