MR. LABILLOIS' KENT COUNTY TACTICS.

published in Weymouth, Nova Scotia, has been trying to defend Mr. Labillois and his anti-Protestant utterances in the late Kent election campaign. Le Moniteur Acadien very sensibly warns L'Evangeline that it is rendering a very poor service to Mr. Labillois in referring to the matter at all. The position taken by Le Moniteur in this matter will commend itself to all classes in this county. It has no sympathy with Mr. Labillois and his anti-Protestant crusade, and it reminds L'Evan. geline that the language used by Mr. Labillois at his St. Mary meeting was so fanatical that Rev. Father Ouillet, who was present, then and there arose and expressed his disapproval of such canvasses, and warned Mr. Labillois that he was pursuing a dangerous course. Rev. Fr. Ouillet on that occassion expressed the feelings of the great body of the Catholics of this county. They recognized the fact that the Catholics and Protestants of the county have always got along very well together, politically and otherwise, and they have as little desire as have the Protestants to mar the existing good feeling by awakening religious prejudices. Mr. Labillois may think he is helping Mr. Blair's cause by such a course, but he will probably learn when he next presents himself to the people of Restigouche for re-election that they have "no use" for him and his political methods. His course in allowing the accusations made against him by the Gleaner and the opposition members of the legislature to pass unchallenged and uninvestigated, will scarcely tend to raise him in the estimation of his constituents.

NO THIRD REPRESENTATIVE.

Why is it that Mr. Blair has not redeemed his promise made to the electors of this county last summer to readjust the representation of the province in the assembly by giving an additional member each to the counties of Kent, Carleton and Gloncester. Mr. Blair and Mr. Labillois, at the beginning of the campaign, annonneed that such was the intention of the government, and immediately the canvass was made from one end of the county to the other, "Vote for Legere and Kent will be given another representative."

We do not think it advisable to increase the number of representatives in the Assembly, but we do think that the representation of the province should be readjusted, and Kent should be given the representation it is justly entitled to. Population is supposed to be the basis of representation. Yet Kent, with a population greater than than of Charlotte County has only two members in the Assembly, while Charlotte has four. Kings County has not as large a population as Kent, yet Kings has three. Northumberland, with about the same number of people as Gloucester, has four representtives, while Gloucester has but two. Westmorland, with twice as many people, has the same number of representatives as Char-

Bills have been introduced in the legislatures of Ontario and Manitoba to readjust the representation in these two provinces, though in neither of them do such glaring irregularities exist in this respect as in New Brunswick. If it is the policy of the government not to decrease the representation of any constituency, then the people of this county demand at least one additional representative. Dr. Atkinson brought the question of increased representation for Kent, Gloucester and Carleton before the legislature last session, and Mr. Blair and Mr. Leger broke faith with the electors of this county when they voted against it.

BLIGHTED PROSPECTS

It was the general opinion in this county until last Thursday that Mr. Phinney, M. P. P., was politically the strongest English speaking man in the county. His opponents admitted that it would be almost impossible to defeat him, while his friends looked upon his election as certain should he decide to again be a candidate for the legislature. CONCESSION OF TREATY MAKING POWER DEMANDED.

A demand was raised anew in the Dominion Parliament a few days ago for Strenuous efforts of an unusual sort are the concession to Canada of the treatymaking power, both with sister dependencies and foreign nations. Parliament refused to join in the demand. It was pleaded that the formal concession of that power was not needed. 
