Work Among the Lumber Camps o New Brunswick.

In response to the request of the Presbytery, I send you an account of some work done among the lumber camps on the Miramichi, Restigouche and Tabusintac rivers. I reached Boiestown on the 7th Jan., and finding it difficult for want of snow to enter the woods, I remained in our mission field till Monday, visiting and preaching in four stations. On the 11th, I entered the woods and visited one camp on Salmon Brook, a stream flowing into the south-west branch of the Miramichi; two on Little Dungarvin, and four on Big Dungarvin, a stream 25 miles from the "South West." On Sabbath I was able to reach four camps and address 85 men. On the 18th, I returned to Boiestown and proceeded to Burntland COMMERCIAL Brook, 36 miles from Big Dungarvin, and on it and Cains River visited five camps. On Friday evening as the sun was setting, I reached Big Cains River, 8 miles from the main portage road and was surprised to see before me in the forest a stream. ordinarilly so shallow, as to require no bridge, but now swollen to the height of 5 or 6 feet. The stream was broad and rapid, and the main channel near the opposite shore open. Seeing two logs spanning the main channel, and upheld by the ice on either side of the rushing torrent. and a pile of heavy fir poles lying on the bank by my side; I laid aside my overcoat and worked in such a vigorous manner as to cause aching limbs, and thus I was able by dark to lead my sure and nimble footed horse, minus all but the bridle, out upon the bridge thus constructed, and safely reach the other side. pephaps never did a more heartfelt "Thank God" escape my lips than on that occasion, and never did I think more joyfully of the triumphant utterance of the believing soul as it reaches the shore of the Heavenly Canaan having been conducted through the Jordan of death by Him who is the way, the truth, the light. Never did I think more seriously of the dark and miserable condition of the unbelieving sinner as he descends into the chilling waters of death and finds no one to meet him on the other side. I traveled a foot-path for 3 miles and surprised the occupants of the camp by appearing at the door with my horse minus harness and sleigh. On Sabbath the 24th, I reached a stream 30 miles distant from Cains River and during the week visited 12 camps. Some situated on Taxis River and some on streams flowing into it. Thus in three weeks and a half I visited 4 settlements. and 24 camps on the Miramichi. Travelled 258 miles by road, crossed 11 streams, and preached to 360 men in the camps. On Feb. 5th, Saturday night, I reached the mouth of the Upsilquitch 18 miles above Campbellton, a large stream entering the Restigouche 7 miles above the 1. C. R. I visited 7 camps on this stream going to the most distant one accessible to horse or sleigh. I also drove up the mountain Restigouche portage road until I reached the uppermost camp on the river, 60 miles from the I. C. R. On this stream, and others flowing into it I visited 11 camps. Thus in 18 days I

visited four settlements and 18 camps;

crossed 12 streams, travelled by road 313
