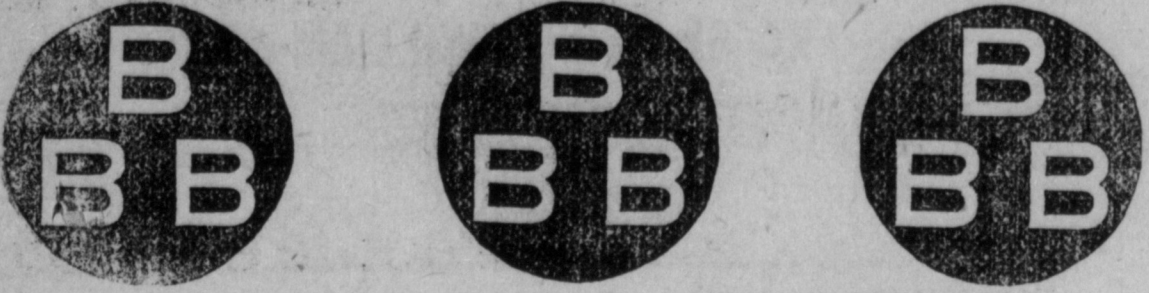

How is business? Quiet, very quiet is
the universal answer to this inquiry. A
hopeful spirit, however, prevails, and with
the belief that the labor troubles will not
be renewed this reason comes a greater
confidence in the future. By the way, to
show how suicidal has been the con-
duct of the mechanics and laborers of St.
John in insisting in only working nine
hours, while the same class in Toronto,
Montreal and Hamilton work ten hours
for the same wages. It is only necessary
to state that a company in the Lower
Provinces requiring some \$70,000.00 to
\$100,000.00 worth of work done asked
for tenders from several firms in St. John
who after a close cut on figures were
obliged to admit that they could not com-
pete, owing to the fact that their men's
time made a difference of ten per cent.
against them. Who knows how many
more orders go the same way.

There is much indignation expressed at
the careless manner in which the custom
house was allowed to burn. Some even
hint that there may have been reasons.

The past week has been one of gaiety
and theatrical circles were animated, as
well as the religious and more sedate ele-
ments. The latter especially in the visit
of Miss Hunt in connection with Temper-
ance education in schools. This good lady
