BLOWING UP IN POLITICAL STRIFE.

Surveyed from one point of view, the much beasted fof free, popular systems of government flourishing in these days, may be shortly defined as government by gab; and political party assaults chiefly consist of a series of blowings up. Blowing up in its most harmless signification means the concentration on an adversary of a stream of denunciation the most bitter and the most violent concoctable. Sometimes recourse to this method appears more or less justifiable. Sometimes it serves good purposes. Sometimes it fails harmessly.

But there is another sort of blowing up occasionally resorted to in political warfare with terrible results. It is the blowing up indulged in by the dynamytard. By its means, Alexander II of Russia, was murdered, and a great many attempts at destruction of life and property was made first and last in Russia. In the pre-Parnellite days, it was largely relied on to further Home Rule interests. There seems reason to fear that recourse may be had again to the same means to further the same cause. The attempt made only a few days ago to blow up an important part of Dublin Castle looks ominous.

I'he improvement made in the manufacture of explosives in these times has placed at the disposal of men, wicked and reckless enough to use them for the purposes of murder, frightful instruments of destruction. Given men ready to sacrifice their own lives, or, at least, to run imminent risk of self destruction, there is no saying what mischief the dynamytard might not effect. The fate of the daft wretch who attempted to blow up Mr. Sage in New York, but blew himself up instead, is instructive. The case illustrates the terrible power of the destructive bomb, and happily the danger of its use, even to the user. It may be that while few men are cruel enough to use the bomb for destruction of others, still fewer will be found brave enough to use them at the risk of their own lives.

Nevertheless, society on both sides of the great ocean will need to keep a sharp lookout for the dynamytard, lest blowing up in its worst form should become an every day event.

The Kirk session supported the minister and decided that the wicked elder should be admonished.
