### Nova Scotia Letter.

May THE REVIEW, its staff, old and young, rich and poor, have a happy New Year, and many of them. May good cheer, bright prospects, and happy homes be as abundant as through the year upon the threshold of which we now stand. A prosperous nation means a happy people, and never have we, as a country, entered upon a year under better circumstances. The abundance in our wheat fields will carry happiness to our homes, as the distance from the land of the hardy tiller of the soil, the backbone of every country, to the millionaire's parlor is not very great. In commerce, every interest is a spoke in the great national wheel, the line from the smallest shop keeper through the large retailer, the wholesale merchant, and the banking house to the treasury is a very direct one, (not the Quebec treasury, for that is nearly empty). It is a truthful saying that the small grocery reflects the financial condition of the country. During the year that is rapidly drawing to a close we have witnessed great changes in the commercial, political, and religious history of the country. But perhaps the most notable event of the year was the death of Canada's greatest statesman, Sir John A. Macdonald, in faithful attention to the business, in thorough acquaintance with the service, which he professed gained for him the confidence of the whole Dominion, lastly he was the father of our confederation, a true Canadian, and the C. P. R. stands to-day a monument to his memory, a national highway from ocean to ocean, and his death, coming as it did in the hour of victory, when his hopes were all but realized, is one of the afflictions dispensations to which we can only bow in silence. Few men had the power to endear and attract to themselves personal friends by stronger ties, and no man has done more to tread down the race barriers which unfortunately are being created in this country. We have a fine country, free institutions, religious liberties, a fine judiciary, and all that goes to make a country great. Let us therefore profit by the lessons of the past year, and let the new year be a living issue, be bright of disposition, carry your cares easy, and thus will you and yours be happy in 1892.

While in Halifax your correspondent had the pleasure of visiting the Carpenters' Union and the Amalgamated Union, in their halls on Barrington street. The latter union is composed of the painters, bricklayers, masons, and all the other trade unions, except the carpenters. The president of the Carpenters' Union, Mr. Lessels, is the right man in the right place. If the employers of labor would attach to the labor question the importance they should attach to it, there would be no strikes, for the level-headed man has few whims and is seldom moved by sentiment, and in all these organizations of labor their are enough of these cool, calculating people to steer clear of strikes, and adjust differences if an opportunity is given them.

The ward politicians have commenced work, and while it is considered that the coming election in Halifax will be a hard fought fight, it is generally believed that the Conservatives will carry the day. A great many are lukewarm. The revelations at Ottawa last winter cannot easily be digested by the Conservative party, while the actions of Canada's only Count are not palatable to the Liberal party. It seems that the time will soon arrive when the names Liberals and Conservatives will cease to exist as party names, and Blake, a McCarthy, a Smith, a Tallion, will be called upon to form the government of country.

### THE JEWS.

What is to be done of them?—Millions of them on the move.  
(Sydney Morning Herald.)

"What is to be done of the Jews?" promises to be shortly one of the burning questions of the age. Many millions of them are now compulsorily on the move, and north, south, east and west public opinion is racked by the question as to where they are to be placed. The great old history book of the race itself is clear enough on the subject, but it is an old-fashioned work that, and smart people often don't care to admit that they pay much attention to it in the solution of great social or national problems. Yet it has been pretty accurate so far about the Jews; and as for the things which it said long ago would befall them "in the latter days," there is a good deal in passing events that are seemingly shadowing them forth. That work says nothing about the Argentine Republic, or Western Australia, or South Africa as a permanent home for the wandering Jew, but it does say a good deal about Palestine, and is very explicit on the subject that the Jews will return to their own land. There are a great many people who would feel insulted if it were charged against them that they did believe the Bible, and yet would let it pass with the smile or the silence of incredulity if you told them things look very much like the return of the Jews just now. A late telegram says that Lord Salisbury has opened the question with the Turkish government through the British embassy at Constantinople as to the possibility of settling the exiled Russian Jews in Palestine. We can hardly think that there could be any insuperable obstacles to the admission of a settled and industrious people into that part of the Turkish empire—a people who certainly would have no reason to love the government of Russia, Turkey's natural and ever aggressive enemy. This is a political view of it; but if we turn to the old book referred to before—and especially its revised version—we see, Ezekiel. 38 to 39 chap., that "the Prince of Rusa" is specially mentioned as destined to have a terrible tussle with a great army of Jews on the very hills of Palestine. Let our readers turn to those chapters if they want some intensely interesting information on coming political events. Things are pointing so that it is worth while looking up prophecy just now. There is a queer shadowy relation between those old prophecies and passing events. In view of the previous persecution and enforced exodus of the Jews, and the feverish military activity of "the Prince of Rusa," combined with the whole Eastern question, there is a good deal in that strange old book worth reading now.

Mr. J. A. Graham intends to take a step out just as soon as the ice makes. As he is a good ice cutter, he can command the best wages at that work, getting ice in Uncle Sam's territory.

A number of our people are laid up with a severe cold, or the grip, but we hope to see them all out again soon.

It is a very hard thing to get the young men back to the woods again now. They can hardly leave at all, some of them have been home 10 days, and it seems just like one to them. Then, to tear themselves away for the rest of the winter—it is hard. We heard of one young man, when he left his best girl the other evening, asking her when he would come again, and she said, about the time the horse flies appear. We think he would be as well in the woods as there any time.
