A Pastoral Letter.

His Lordship the Metropolitan, has addressed the following pastoral letter to the clergy of his diocese:—

My Dear Brethren:—You are aware that some years since I thought it prudent, in view of a possible failure of health and strength on my part, to obtain the assistance of a Coadjutor, in order that the work of the Diocese might not be impeded. It has pleased God to take from me some portion of the strength that then remained, and I feel no longer able to undertake the laborious journeys which, up to a later period, God gave me strength to perform. Painful as it is to me to abridge any part of my former duty, I am obliged, at the age of eighty-seven, to ask you to consult with the Coadjutor as to any confirmations for the coming year, and as to the administrative work of the Diocese in general, reserving to myself such work as is practicable for a man in my present condition. You will, I feel assured, not put this down to any want of affection or earnestness on my part, and will help me with your kind words and earnest prayers, that what remains of my life may be spent to the glory of God, and to the good of the Church, over which the Lord hath made me an overseer.

Praying for a blessing on what has been done, and what remains to be done, I remain your faithful and affectionate friend,

Reverend Dear Sir.—In recalling to mind the many pleasant interviews we have had together during your short pastorate in Buctouche, and feeling that there is a bond of relationship between us which we trust, in more than one instance, death itself cannot dissolve, we cannot allow you to leave us without handing to you this small tribute of our affection, which may be to you a standing memorial of genuine friendship between us, and we sincerely trust that while you are sitting in this chair and are writing at this desk, the results of your collective studies for another people, your prayers for us and ours for you, shall often co-mingle on their way to the throne of God.
