Ordered, That the license inspector re-

port to-morrow at 2 p. m.

Councillor Murphy reports on delin-

quent lists of Weldford sent to him, re-

turning lists as sent out, he and his col-

league considering there was nothing to be

collected from them.

Resolved, That all returns from coun-

cillors on delinquent lists sent them, be

handed to the auditor, audited, and hand-

ed to Finance Committee.

Council adjourned until 10 a. m. to-

morrow.

WEDNESDAY, Jan 13th, 1892. 10 a. m.

Council called to order at 10 a. m. All

present except Councillor Wathen.

Minutes of last meeting read and ap-

proved.

Councillor Wathen excused from at-

tendance on account of sickness.

Gaol Committee, 1891; accepted.

applicants for hotel license.

appointed to confer with the inspector on

license matters and report to-morrow at 2

p. m.

LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

Mr. Hanington Addresses the Assem-
bly for the Last Time.

Immediately after the reading of the

journal of the house Tuesday afternoon,

Mr. Hanington, who was received with

prolonged applause, made a far-well ad-

dress to the assembly. The announce-

ment having been made of his elevation

to the judiciary, he asked, as a matter of

courtesy, the privilege of saying a few

words of farewell. In doing so he could

assure all, that while appreciating the

high and honorable distinction conferred

upon him, he parted with his friends on

the floors of the assembly, as well as those

who were not on the floors with the great-

est regret. He believed he would not

cease to have a longing for the old legis-

lative halls that had been a home to him

for almost a quarter of a century. (Ap-

plause.) When as a law student he had

first come to the city of Fredericton—this

beautiful city of Fredericton—the citizens

of which had uniformly shown to him, as

to all the members of this legislature, the

utmost kindness, and the most generous

hospitality. (Applause.) He had been

received with a courtesy, and a good will

which had never abated in after years, and

which no one could appreciate more than

himself. That was in 1854, and since that

many changes had taken place in the leg-

islative halls; not one voice sounded in

the assembly now that was heard in that

day. The names of John R. Partelow, of

Street, of Hazen, of Chandler and Hill,

who had led successive governments in

this province, were only echoes of the past.

They had passed away, and their places

had been filled by gentlemen who still in

one walk or another adorned the political

history of the country. One of the most

prominent members, though still a very

young man in those days, was our present

and most respected governor, Sir Leonard

Tilley. (Applause.)

Mr. Hanington then referred to the late

Judge Fisher, who he said had never been

excelled, for constitutional knowledge and

ability as a legislator in the province; to

Chief Justice Ritchie, who so well adorns

his present position, to John M. Johnson,

who possessed one of the cleverest and

best of legal minds; to Chief Justice

Parker, and to that most wonderfully elo-

quent and gifted man, whose oratory had

never been surpassed on the continent of

America—the late L. A. Wilnot. (Ap-

plause.)

Passing on, he referred to the very cor-

dial relations that had always existed be-

tween himself and his colleagues, both in

the late government and in the present

opposition. He was now the oldest mem-

ber in the house except the hon. member

from Sunbury (Mr. Perley). When he

(Hanington) was a student-at-law, Mr.

Perley was a representative for Sunbury,

and he had almost continuously ever since

held the confidence of the county. There

were now coming up in the legislature

young men of ability, in whose hands he

believed the destiny of this country would

be perfectly safe, and who would transmit

the traditions of our legislative history

unimpaired. He had never regretted en-

tering
