A meeting for the relief of St. John's was called by Quebec aldermen on Friday afternoon. There was no quorum and the matter was postponed until this week. Much unfavorable comment has been caused by the action.

C. O. Swanson, agent of the immigration department at Montreal, on Saturday met forty delegates from Maine and Massachusetts who are on their way to examine into the resources of the Northwest Territories. If their decision regarding the country is favorable a large party from these States will come to Canada.

A citizen of Newcastle, Penn., has six trained toads. The reptiles have been taught to march or hop in squads to catch roaches. One has been trained to climb a ladder while another turns the crank of a small churn.
