Further, he has a movable set of ribs which he causes to change places one with another. It is said that a Beverly physician examined him and found all this to be just so.

—The Pride-Delaney case has occupied the attention of the County Court six days. The jury disagreed after wrestling with the case about two hours. This matter has excited a great deal of interest throughout the County, as it is a "burning" question to the people of Kent. Mr. Delaney brought action against Mr. Pride for the recovery of damages alleged to have resulted from fire said to have been started by Pride, whereby Delaney lost a large amount of valuable standing lumber as well as a quantity of hemlock bark, etc.

**Fatal Accident.**  
A sad accident which terminated fatally, happened to a young man, James John Murphy, son of Robert Murphy, (farmer) of Kouchibouguac, at Harry Whalen's lumber camps on the head waters of the Kouchibouguac river on Thursday last. The young man was engaged in chopping, when his axe slipped, striking him on the heel and inflicting an ugly gash, from which the blood flowed freely. The accident occurred some three miles from the camp, and he was taken there by his fellow workmen on a horse's back losing much blood on the way. On reaching the camp, they managed to staunch the flow of blood for a time, but it commenced to bleed afresh on the following day, and despite all efforts made to stop the flow of blood, the young man gradually grew weaker and expired at nine o'clock Friday night. The remains were conveyed to Kouchibouguac on Saturday and Dr. Bourque, deeming an inquest necessary, the jury found a verdict according to the above facts. The deceased was about 20 years of age. Had his companions understood how to treat a case of this nature they would have doubtless succeeded in arresting the flow of blood till the arrival of a physician. Imagine putting a man on horseback and travelling three miles, thereby forcing the blood through the wound as rapidly as possible.

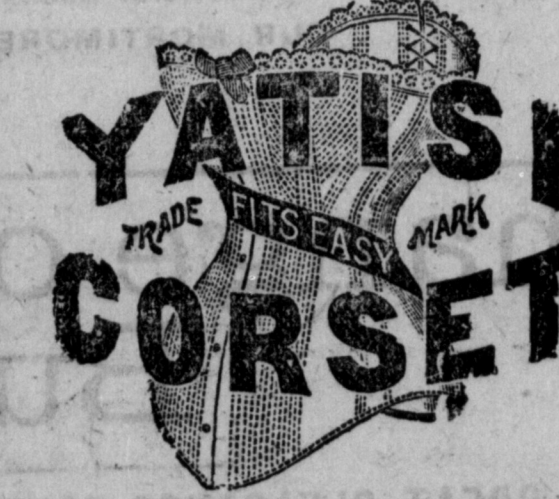

## NUGGETS.

—The Conservative majority in Richmond, C. B., is 318.  
—School district No. 10, Parish of Welford, wants a teacher.  
—Horses are dying of the grip in California.

—A farmer living near Campbellton dropped dead on Saturday afternoon. He was in the fifty-fifth year of his age and in his usual good health at dinner time.

—Some large trout have been taken recently in the Kouchibouguac river. One of them weighed seven and one half pounds.

—Mr. George Hudson found a codfish weighing six pounds in his smelt net on Monday last, which is set three miles above Kingston bridge.

—Mr. Malcolm McLean has commenced building a schooner of 75 tons. His sons, who have been working in the United States, intend returning to build and sail the vessel.

—Mr. David Palmer, Kingston, has an ossified apple found by one of his boys among some ballast last summer. Mr. P. has also a fine collection of flint arrow heads, a knife, and a stone axe.

—An experiment is being made in shipping fresh Salmon from the Pacific Coast to Europe. If it be successful fresh salmon will be shipped hereafter instead of canned salmon. Thirty thousand pounds of fresh salmon were shipped in a car from Fraser River last week, going by way of the Canadian Pacific to New York, and thence in the cold storage room of a German steamship to Hamburg.

—Mr. Joseph Grogan, of Kouchibouguac, received a letter from Rev. E. A. Garvey, of Williamsport, Penn., conveying the sad intelligence of the death of his brother Charles, in an hospital in that city. The unfortunate young man had been struck by a log running down a mountain and was taken to the hospital, where he died a few days subsequently. Deceased was but twenty-three years of age, and highly esteemed by all who knew him.

—Wm. J. Bowser, barrister, of Vancouver, lately purchased half of the schooner Maud M. from Capt. Wm. Malley, of Kingston. The purchasers of the Maud M., Messrs. Wilson & Cassidy, former residents of the Miramichi, sent Capt. Jas. Wilson, son of Peter Wilson, of Kingston, from Vancouver, to North Sydney, Cape Breton, to take the schooner to British Columbia. The little vessel started on her long voyage on the 29th ult. The Maud M. was built in Kingston in 1890. She will be sent to the Behring Sea to engage in the seal fishery. This is the second vessel built in Kingston that has gone to the Behring Sea seal fishing. The Pathfinder one of the most successful of the seal fishing fleet, having been built in Jardine's Yard by Messrs. Walker & McLean. We understand the Maud M. is the smallest vessel (75 tons) that has ever gone on this long voyage. When she arrives at Vancouver Captain Malley will proceed to that port and assume command.

—The Mayor and a dozen other residents of Vancouver city made a visit to the shipyard on English Bay to inspect the new steamer which is being built for the Vancouver Steamship Company by Messrs. Brown and Purdy. All were greatly surprised at the strength of the timber and natural formation of the wood which is specially suitable for ship-building. The steamer will be classed in Lloyds as well as in Bureau Veritas, and owing to her being so much in excess of all requirements, she will probably be classed A 1 for eleven or twelve years instead of ten. The Mr. Brown referred to above is Mr. Robert Brown late of Bass River, Kent County. Mr. Purdy belongs to Westmorland County.

—Mr. Andrew Dunn, who has been in town attending County Court, while in THE REVIEW office Saturday related an incident that goes to show that there are still honest men in the world. It is as follows: John Bernard, who went to the States about ten years ago was indebted to Mr. Dunn to the amount of \$15.15. He heard from Bernard but once during that time to inform him that he had made arrangements with a party near Welford to pay the amount but who refused to settle with Mr. Dunn, alleging that Bernard had not made any arrangements for him to pay the account. In the meantime Mr. D. had never been able to communicate with Bernard as he could not learn his address. Under the circumstances our informant was very much surprised and pleased recently to receive a letter from Bernard with \$17.00 enclosed, who said he had forgotten how much the account was but thought the amount sent sufficient to pay the bill. He regretted that the bill had not been paid before and said he thought it had been settled as arranged.
