Cure for Diphtheria.

The following clipping has been handed to THE REVIEW, and is published for the benefit of the public at large:

Here are the directions: Pour equal parts of turpentine and tar into a cup or pan, and set fire to the mixture, taking care to have a larger pan under it, as a safeguard against fire. A dense resinous smoke arises, making the room dark. "The patient" Dr. Delthill says, "immediately seems to experience relief; the choking and rattle stop; the patient falls asleep, and seems to inhale the smoke with pleasure. The fibrinous membrane soon becomes detached, and the patient coughs up microbicides. These when caught in a glass, may be seen to dissolve in the smoke. Curtis, head of the Bureau of Latin Republics, both of whom expressed a lively interest in the undertaking, which will be a worthy beginning of the great quadro-centennial celebration of America.

A Big Salmon Crop.

This is a great year for big crops. Now it is the salmon crop that exceeds anything in the history of the country. Puget Sound is reported to be so filled with salmon, making their annual run to the sound shores and the fresh water streams for feeding and spawning, that the steamboats seem to be floating on a solid mass of fish. The paddles kill hundreds of them and are choked up with their bodies. The sound steamer captains describe the run as an unbroken string of salmon thirty miles long, the water for that distance being fairly alive with them.

Neither the oldest inhabitants nor the aged Indians remember such a big salmon run. The result of the enormous run is a big reduction in prices. Usually good salmon sell for ten to twenty-five cents apiece, but now at one cent each the market is glutted with the finest quality of fish. At Port Williams a few days ago two casts of a seine netted over 3,000 fine salmon. Everybody is fishing.
