—Mr. James Marsh's residence at Bass River was totally destroyed by fire last week. Part of the furniture was saved. Insurance \$600. —Cyrus McLean, Chatham, who is charged with perjury by Inspector Menzies, has been held for trial, himself in \$400 and two others in \$200 each.

The church was worth about \$5000. It was insured for \$1200 in the North British and Mercantile Co.

—The dwelling house of Mr. Thomas Harnett, of Main River, was burned to the ground last Saturday night. Mr. Harnett's family had barely time to escape from the burning building. No insurance. —Mr. Legere, M. P. P., is certainly making a name for himself in the county. His first vote was given in favor of direct taxation, his second was against an increase in the representation of this county in the Assembly.
