

John, seven hundred and fifty dollars and an additional sum in respect of each office or agency, including the principal office in the province, up to and not exceeding four offices, one hundred dollars each; for banks having a capital of \$500,000 and upwards and less than a million of dollars whose organization is without the province and not having an agency in St. John, five hundred dollars and an additional sum in respect of each office or agency, up to and not exceeding four, one hundred dollars each; for banks whose organization is within the province with a capital not exceeding \$200,000, and whose head office is not in St. John, two hundred dollars, and an additional sum for all agencies or branch offices up to and not exceeding four, one hundred dollars each.

Hon. Mr. Blair explained to the House that the tax on the various banks under the schedule would be as follows: Bank of New Brunswick \$1,100 Bank of British North America 1,200 Bank of Montreal 1,300 Bank of Nova Scotia 1,400 Halifax Banking Co. 950 People's Bank of Halifax 900 Merchant's Bank 800 People's Bank of Fredericton 200 St. Stephen's Bank 200

Total \$8,050 The resolution was carried, 21 to 14, the division being the same as before except that Dr. Atkinson was present and voted with the nays, while Messrs. Porter and Burchill were absent.
