—A project for the settlement of 500 Russian-Hebrew families in Winnipeg has been brought before the London Russian-Hebrew committee. It provides for a combination of railroad work with farming.

—Mrs. Florence Ethel Osborne, sentenced to nine months imprisonment for theft of pearls from Mrs. Hargraves and subsequent perjury, has been released from prison by order of home Secretary Matthews.

The operation was performed and the tumor removed, but she died a short time afterwards. Deceased was a niece of Father Michaud, of Buctouche, and her funeral was very largely attended by the citizens of Buctouche of all denominations. She was 38 years of age.
