A BRAVE CAPTAIN.

Experience of a St. John Boy in the Indian Ocean.

The Indian Daily News of Saturday June 18th contains the following:—

The pluck and daring of British seamen have formed the theme of many an exciting narrative. It not infrequently happens, when a vessel, after weathering a heavy storm, comes into port for repairs, and an inquiry is made into how the vessel has received the damage she has sustained, it is discovered that it has been through the unremitting energy and pluck of the Captain and officers that the ship has been saved from total destruction. It is now our pleasing duty to give to the public a tale of how a captain of a four-masted sailing vessel, his crew for the most part sick and dying, wrought the ship almost single handed, and brought her into port in safety, not the slightest portion of the valuable cargo on board being damaged in the least. While in Calcutta recently, it will be remembered Captain T. H. Lyons, of the Crofton Hall, had not a little trouble with his crew through several of them absenting themselves from duty, and having to be arrested and brought back to the vessel. But worse trouble was to follow. The Crofton Hall, with a full cargo of linseed loaded by Messrs. Malli, left the pilot station on the fourth of this month, bound for Hull. She had not been at sea a day, when a serious epidemic of cholera broke out amongst the crew. The first signs of sickness manifested itself on the morning of the 5th, when one of the apprentices fell sick and died. The same night an A. B. seaman fell a victim to the terrible disease, dying a few hours after he was attacked. Sickness now became general, the cholera taking the form of an epidemic. Almost simultaneously four men went down, two of them succumbing on the 8th. These were followed by six more, so that it may be imagined how sorely the ship was crippled for want of men to handle the sails, particularly as a terrific gale was now blowing—an occasion when every hand on a ship is wanted. While the vessel was laboring heavily, and shipping large quantities of water, Captain Lyons lost the much required services of his chief officer, who was now laid low by an attack of the plague, though it is gratifying to learn he has now recovered. By this time, however, the Captain found himself in a most unenviable position. His ship was laboring in a severe storm and all the hands he had to depend upon were two officers, four men and three boys, one or two of whom were also rendered unfit by sickness before the ship was got out of danger. Finding himself in such a plight, and perceiving the futility of attempting to proceed on the voyage, he determined to put the ship about, and endeavor to make the best of his way back to Calcutta. Considering that there were twenty-three men unfit for duty, and that he had been unable to take observations from the day after sailing, only seafaring men will understand the difficulty Captain Lyons must have experienced in steering the Crofton Hall back to Sandhead, in a heavy gale of wind too. But that he accomplished in safety. Surely this is a feat on the part of the captain of a vessel worth recording. Had the Crofton Hall been a steamer it would not have been a very difficult task; but being a sailing vessel, which depends solely on its sheets of canvas, the intricate working of which requires many skilled hands, the feat performed by Captain Lyons is one of those remarkable instances of smart seamanship one hears of but seldom. It could only have been accomplished by downright hard work, the most skillful management, the utmost care, and thorough British pluck. That he deserves commendation for what he has done goes without saying, and the honor of course must be shared by those few hardy men, who, never knowing when the terrible disease might claim them as victims, wrought so hard under him to bring the ship with its valuable cargo and cholera-stricken crew into harbor.

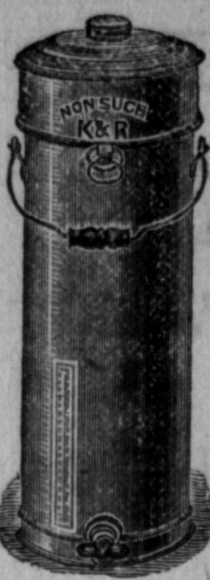
