Public Meeting.

The public meeting called by the high sheriff, in compliance with a requisition, to consider the question of the erection of requisite and suitable public buildings by the Dominion government in the shire town of Kent, having been adjourned until the 21st instant, a large number of the citizens of Richibucto and vicinity, as well as a full representation of the municipal council—which had been in session during the forenoon and adjourned to permit the members of the board attending the meeting—assembled in the court house at 2 o'clock p. m. of Thursday last.

In the absence of the sheriff, the warden, Thomas Atkinson, upon request, took the chair, and briefly indicated the object of the meeting, expressing his full sympathy with it.

J. D. Phinney was upon motion appointed secretary.

The first resolution, moved by C. C. Carlyle, and seconded by G. V. McInerney, was as follows:—

Whereas, Suitable public buildings in a town are a marked influence not only upon visitors to the locality in forming their opinion as to the importance and prosperity of the place but have also an influence upon the inhabitants in developing correct tastes and a pride in their place of residence.

And whereas, the buildings now occupied as public offices by the Dominion government in the town of Richibucto are not adequate for the purposes of the trade of this port and the importance of the business interests of the shire town of this large and flourishing county.

Therefore resolved, that in the opinion of this meeting an effort should at once be made to meet the want, and procure from the Dominion government public buildings that will be suited to the requirements and importance of the town.

The mover and seconder spoke at considerable length, and the resolution, after being supported by Councillors Bernard, Gesner, B. J. Johnson, Peters and Murphy, and Messrs A. Legere, J. T. Caie, and J. D. Phinney, was unanimously adopted.

The second resolution, moved by J. D. Phinney and seconded by Councillor B. J. Johnson, and adopted, was:—

buildings in this town is a matter of importance and interest to the whole county, and the subject should again be urged upon the attention of the Dominion government.

Therefore resolved, that a committee composed of the warden of the county, the high sheriff, and five gentlemen to be named by the chairman, be appointed to memorialize the government, and press upon them the advisability of asking Parliament at its next session for an appropriation for that purpose.

The chairman nominated as members of the committee, in addition to the sheriff and warden, J. D. Phinney, A. Legere, G. V. McInerney, B. J. Johnson, John Stevenson.

After a vote of thanks to the chairman, the meeting adjourned.

THE REGISTERED Trotting-Bred Stallion KINGSTONE.
