Burglars at Bathurst.

BATHURST, Aug. 6—Ever since the 1st of June Bathurst has received visits from tramps. One gang camped on the Nepesquit River, and for a number of weeks were a terror to the people of that vicinity. They were finally routed and it was supposed took the road to Chatham. The descriptions given of the man "Buck" now in jail, and "Jim" who is at large corresponded with the description of the parties seen around here about the first of July or last of June. These parties stole considerable from the farmers around Bathurst. On July 24th an attempt was made to enter DesBrisay's store in Petit Rocher. The burglars were fired at by watchmen and returned the fire, a bullet taking effect in the watch dog's body. Searching parties were organized here last week and scoured the town and village, but in vain Mr. Tramp was no where to be found.

A week ago last Wednesday morning Mr. Hugh Kent discovered four of these travelers in a barn on the basin side of the village. The description he gives corresponds with that of the parties arrested at Truro this week. He says, one had his arm in a sling and told him he had met with an accident in Quebec by which he had broken it, and that he was on his way to Halifax. They left in the direction of Newcastle same day.

People are greatly frightened here and many are kept from sleeping at nights from fear of a nocturnal visit from the desperados. On Friday morning the Sheriff shadowed a suspicious looking character but finally found out the man was all right. Should "Jim" come this way he will meet with a warm reception as the brutal murder of Steadman has raised excitement here to such an extent that the tramp who will fall into the hands of these on the alert, will wish himself in a more comfortable climate than ours.

An attempt was made Wednesday night to enter the Convent of the Sacred Heart here. The sisters in charge gave alarm by ringing a school bell. Assistance immediately arrived, but nothing could be found of the prowlers.—Transcript.
