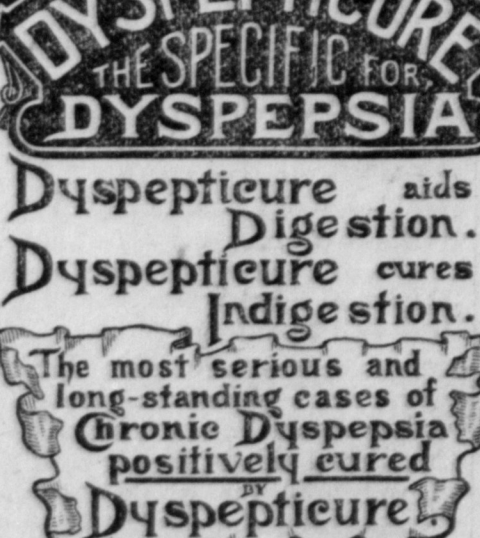

TALKS FOR THE FARMER.

STRAWSTACK STATESMANSHIP BY WITTY FARMER JOHN.

The Symptoms of Lump Jaw—Lice on Plants—The Early Vegetables—Luxuries on the Farm—The Cracks in Cow's Teats—A Skin Disease.

There's a patent on almost everything but hard work and politicians' promises. About the hardest things a farmer can raise are a bound child and a mortgage. A man has got to be a better farmer than his father was to keep from being a worse one.

A good way to tell a growler at hard times is by his chickens roosting in the trees. One disadvantage the farmer has: he can't mark his goods to cover the loss of a dead horse.

One consolation Daniel had in the lions' den: the lightning-rod man wouldn't likely follow him there. No political movement can bring prosperity to the owner of the slab stable who feeds nothing but cornstalks.

The liberty pole is raised about election time to signify that a citizen is free to vote any way his party caucus says. As long as it is supposed anyone has brains enough to run a farm there'll always be some one with a little more brains to run that sort of farmers.

What time the devil isn't busy tending the fires he must be starting out agents with promissory notes as innocent looking as a recipe for corn-dodgers. To be neighborly, you don't have to let blackberries grow in the place of blue-grass for fellers to pick that cuss you for a lazy hound every brier they run in their fingers.

Symptoms of Lump Jaw. Lump jaw or actinomycosis usually begins with a swelling somewhere about the face or the lower jaw. This swelling, which is hard, increases in size slowly and if not injured in any way or opened with the knife may continue growing for a long time as a hard, more-or-less painful swelling. As the growth increases it encroaches upon the sockets of the teeth (the teeth may fall out) and so interfere with mastication; this in turn affecting the animal's general health and condition. Sooner or later the matter (pus) that has been forming within the spongy tissue of the bone makes an opening for itself, either through the mouth or externally at some point on the jaws, and from this time on the case is one of a hard tumor of more or less irregular outline and discharging matter mixed with fragments of bone. The foregoing description applies to actinomycosis affecting the bones of the face and jaws; but the disease may attack any of the internal organs, or in fact almost any part of the body, the symptoms varying with the part attacked in a given case. The disease, when thoroughly established, is practically incurable; and inasmuch as it may be transmitted from one animal to another, and from animal to man, cases should be isolated and handled with caution.

Lice on Plants. Lice cause more trouble to plants than any other one thing. The red spider and green louse are the most common. The quickest and surest way to get rid of them is to use the kerosene solution, recommended for spraying fruit, and this will not hurt the plants and is made as follows: Dissolve 2 oz of bar soap in 1 qt of hot water, and while still warm stir in 2 qts of kerosene oil, and churn violently with a force pump or syringe. When ready to spray dilute with nine parts of water. The fumes of sulphur are objectionable to the red spider. Tobacco will also kill most insects and is easily and cheaply applied. Put the plants under a barrel or box and place some tobacco stems on hot coals. Let them be smoked thoroughly for 15 minutes.

The Early Vegetables. Carrots, beets and parsnips should go in the ground early, but not when the soil is too cold, as such seeds are slow in germinating, and the young plants may be crowded out by the early weeds. Make the seed bed as fine as an ashheap, and sow radish seed in the rows with the root crops, as the radish seeds germinate quickly, come through and define the rows, thus permitting of the use of the hoe until the seeds of the root crops appear, when the young radishes may be removed.

Luxuries on the Farm. The first duty of a farmer is to supply his home with all the various luxuries that can be grown on a farm. With the many varieties of fruits and vegetables that can be produced on a farm the farmer should be able to have nearly all his wants supplied, so far as his table is concerned. In estimating the receipts for the year the farmer should always include those articles supplied by him to his family.

The Cracks in Cow's Teats. Should be carefully penciled with a crayon of nitrate of silver sharpened to a fine point; care being taken that every part of the crack is touched by the silver. Apply the crayon night and morning of one day only and on the following day dress the cracks with the benzoated oxide of zinc ointment. The teats should be carefully dried after each milking.

A Skin Disease. The crests that form in a line extending forward from just in front of the cow's udder are caused by a disease of the skin. Apply a little of the following ointment twice daily, having previously got rid of as much of the scabiness as possible by soaking the crests with olive oil: Sulphuret of potash one dram, lard one ounce, to be thoroughly mixed together.

Manure for Hotbeds. When using manure for hotbeds discard all litter. Fresh horse manure is best and it should be well tramped down in the bed. To hasten the heat moisten the manure with lime water.

Most people suppose that the manufacture of tobacco consists merely of taking the leaf and pressing it into plugs. The fact is, however, that the process is a very delicate one, and the least false step will injure the flavor. The leaf must be carefully attended to for months after it leaves the planter's hands. It must neither dry too quickly or too slowly. Even after it has reached the factory the utmost delicacy of manipulation is required. The weather must be carefully studied, for if there is too much moisture in the air when it is pressed it will mould, and the same will happen if too much moisture is sprinkled upon it for the purpose of opening the leaf. Again, if it is overdried in the oven it will turn crisp, and nip the tongue in smoking. It is by careful attention to all these points that the "Myrtle Navy" has been brought to such perfection. The firm who manufacture it have their own storehouses in Virginia, and from the time the leaf leaves the planter's hands until it leaves the factory, months afterwards, in plugs, it is under the care of their skilled and trusted employes.

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
