

LOCAL & GENERAL.

PUBLIC BUILDING.—Signatures are being asked to a petition requesting the Dominion Government to erect a public building in the town of Richibucto.

LAWN TENNIS.—Mr. Fred Ferguson has put up a lawn tennis net in the lawn opposite his father's house and lovers of the game may be seen in attendance there nearly every evening.

SCHOONER TELEPHONE.—Messrs. Bowser and Weston have bought the schooner Telephone from parties in Cape Breton to replace the Blondelle, wrecked on the Richibucto Beach some time ago.

PASSENGER CAR.—The passenger car on the N. B. R. is about finished and will be put on the road again this week. Messrs. John Scott and George Wilson who had the job in hand have repaired it in good style.

A RUMOR.—The Moncton Times of last Tuesday stated that a rumor was in circulation there that the Buctouche train had gone through the Buctouche Bridge and that six people had been killed. Happily the report turned out to be untrue.

NEW BRIDGE AT GASPEREAU CREEK.—A notice has been posted by the public works department calling for tenders for the construction of a new bridge over GasperEAU Creek near Richibucto Village. The old bridge will first be removed and the new one built in the same place.

TWO MORE ARRIVALS AT THIS PORT.—May 26, Barque Christian William, 386 tons, Captain Kverndal, 25 days passage from Madeira, Spain, chartered by George K. McLeod, Esq. May 28, Barque Ellen, 428 tons, Captain Anderson, 36 days passage from Belboa, Spain. Chartered by E. Walker, Esq.

PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—While driving the delivery team of Messrs J. & T. Jardine through Kingston, Mr. James Bellamy met with a very distressing accident. He had in the waggon a barrel of flour on which he was sitting. The waggon struck a large stone with such force that he was thrown out, and received a severe contusion on the head which for a time rendered him unconscious. Fortunately Dr. Doherty was close at hand who dressed the wound and in a short time after he was driven home by Mr. Edward Harnett.

SUCCESSFUL BUSINESS.—Although but one year in business the enterprising wholesale grocery firm of F. P. Reid & Co., of Moncton, have already pressed to a first place. The mention of a few articles will give an idea of their extensive stock now in hand, viz: 2,000 bbls. flour, 350 bbls. sugar, 250 hf. chests tea, other lines in proportion. Their main building is 100 ft. long, and from cellar to upper story (three stories) is completely packed. Outside the main building they have stores for holding molasses, flour, fish, oil, etc. The success of the firm is largely due to the popularity of Mr. Reid, who while representing the enterprising grocery firm of Messrs. Baird & Peters, of St. John, made himself a general favorite amongst business houses throughout the provinces.

IMMENSE ICEBERGS.—The Swedish bark "Elin," of Coteburg, Capt. Anderson, arrived on the 28th inst., from Bilbao, Spain, after a 36 days voyage. The captain reports that the first fortnight he had remarkably fine weather and favorable wind. On the 19th May, in north lat. 45.04, west lon. 48.40, passed nine icebergs during the day averaging fully 100 feet out of water; on the 17, two, and on the 18th, two more and of about the same height. The whole 13 would be as nearly as he could estimate over one quarter of a mile in length. After that he experienced very bad weather, thick fog with heavy adverse gales with extremely rough sea running. The position of the vessel and all hands when near the bergs was most dangerous, but fortunately escaped contact, which, on several occasions was most imminent. The barkentine "Lilly," of Fordernekstad, Capt. Olsen, arrived on the 19th inst., from Davenport, England, also reports having, on the 7th of May passed in N. lat. 44.35 W. lon. 48.00 an immense iceberg, fully 150 feet in height and about three-quarters of a mile long, with continued heavy weather during the latter part of the voyage.

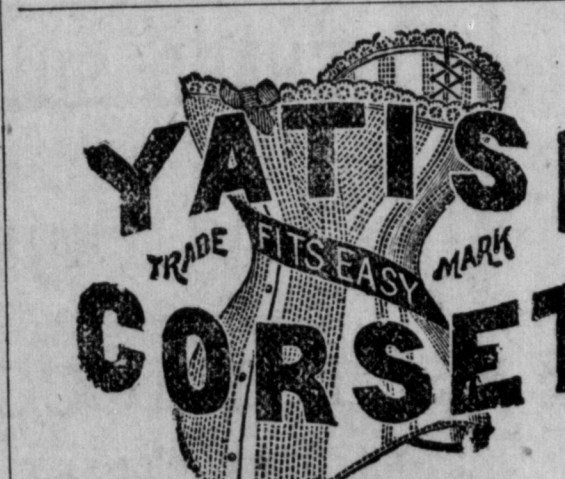
