

LOCAL & GENERAL.

Arrested. Mr. Auguste Renaud, of Buctouche, was arrested last Thursday on a judge's order in the cause Allan vs. Renaud. He was conveyed to jail, but afterwards admitted to bail to the limits.

The First Arrivals. Two of Messrs. J. & T. Jardine's vessels, the Sagona and Ossuna, captains McKay and Shand, have arrived at this port. Two Norwegian vessels that left the other side for here before Messrs. Jardine's vessels have not yet reported.

The Weather. The very cold weather and high winds of the past week have not only retarded farmers in putting in their crops, but have prevented fishermen from getting to their herring nets. The chances are that bait will be very scarce this summer.

Unable to Procure Bail. Sylvain Babane, who was committed for trial some time ago before Justice Caie, on the charge of forging fishery bounty declarations, is still in jail. Judge Landry made an order allowing bail with two securities of \$300 each. He has so far been unable to procure the necessary bail.

Hotel Changes. Mr. Philip Woods gave up the Kent Hotel to Mr. John Irving last Thursday, and moved into the Loggie house. He has fitted up this house and will run it as a hotel. Mr. Irving is making some improvements in the Kent, and intends running it as a first class hotel. Richibucto is now very well supplied with hotel accommodation.

Accident. Andrew Tweedie, son of Andrew Tweedie of Kouchibouguac, recently met with an accident at Westport, Pa., (where he has resided for some years), which it is feared will cause his death. He fell from a loft in a stable and sustained injuries which produced paralysis of the lower limbs. The latest reports received by his friends leave but little hope of his recovery. He is a married man with one child.

Loss of a Valuable Horse. Mr. Geo. W. Robertson had the misfortune to lose a valuable horse last Friday. Mr. Robertson started for Buctouche in the morning. He drove the horse there, and returned in the evening by way of Richibucto Cape. Just as he reached the Grammar School Corner the horse fell, and died a short time afterwards. A post-mortem was held by some of our local veterinary surgeons, but the cause of the animal's death could not be ascertained.

Obituary. We have this week to record the death of Mr. John W. Kirkland, who died at his residence in Kingston last Friday morning. Deceased was a native of Fredericton. Nearly forty years ago he came to Kingston, where he has resided ever since. He was by occupation a painter and cabinet maker, and was held in the highest esteem by his friends and neighbors. A few weeks ago, he was first attacked by paralysis, a second and third attack resulted in his death. The funeral, which was very largely attended took place last Sunday. His remains were buried in the Presbyterian burying ground at Kingston. Mrs. McIntosh his daughter, and Mr. A. Prowse, his son-in-law, both of Murray Harbor, P. E. I., arrived here too late to see him alive. Deceased was sixty years of age.
