Historical Items.

In the eruption of Vesuvius, A. D. 79 the scoria and ashes vomited forth far exceeded the entire bulk of the mountain; while in 1650, Etna discharged more than twenty times its own mass. Vesuvius has sent its ashes as far as Constantinople, Syria and Egypt. It hurled stones eight pounds weight to Pompeii, a distance of six miles, while similar masses were tossed up 2000 feet above its summit. [Cotopax has projected a block 108 cubic yards in volume a distance of 9 miles; and Sumbowa, 1815, during the most terrible eruntion on record, sent its ashes as far as Java, a distance of over 300 miles of surface, and out of a population of 12,000 souls only 20 escaped.

Richmond, in Surry, England, was anciently called Sheen, which in the Saxon tongue signifies resplendent. Here stood the palace in which Edward I. and II. resided and Edward III died, 1377. Anne, queen of Richard II., also died there. The palace was repaired by Henry V., who founded three religious houses near it. In 1497 it was destroyed by fire; but Henry VII. rebuilt it, and commanded that the village should be called Richmond; and he also died there in 1509. Queen Elizabeth was a prisoner in this palace for a short time during the reign of her sister; when she became queen it was one of her favorite places of residence, and here she died in 1603. It was afterward the residence of Henry Prince of Wales. The beautiful bark and gardens were enclosed by Charles I. The cobservattory was built by Sir W. Chambers, in 1760. In Richmond, Thomson sang "the seasons and their change," and died in 1748.
