The Approaching Great Battle Between Sullivan and Corbett.

Corbett the man who is to meet the great John L. Sullivan was born in San Francisco, Sept. 1, 1866, and is, therefore, nearly 26 years of age. In his youth he was noted as a frank brave, quick fellow and a great athlete. He was a terrific batter and a quick, sure fielder. For several years he was clerk in the Nevada Bank. During all this time he kept up his athletic connections and soon showed himself the best boxer in his club.

His first fight of any consequence was with David Elseman. Corbett was then 17 years of age. Two rounds sufficed to settle his opponent. James Daly was his next opponent and he got enough in four rounds. Among others who next succumbed in turn to the young Californian were Martin Costello, Duncan McDonald, Frank Smith, Joe Chovuski and Dominick McCaffrey. Corbett's drawn battle of 61 rounds with Peter Jackson, who fought the great battle recently in England with Slavin, was an eye opener to many who had sneered at the claims of 'Frisco boy. His tour of the country and his feat of knocking out two men and besting the third in one night are fresh in the memories of all readers of sporting news. Since his battle with Jackson, Corbett has knocked out no less than 25 men, some of them outweighing him 40 pounds.

In personal appearance the great boxer is a tall, powerfully built man, with well expanded chest and splendid shoulders. He weighs now 190 pounds, and will fight at 188. He stands 6 feet 1 1/2 inches in his stockings. In spite of his size, he is easy and graceful in all his movements.

Corbett does not say much about his chances in the coming fight. His unvarying answer to all questions on this subject is: "If faithful training will beat Sullivan, I shall do it."

His managers and trainers, however, are not so reticent. They never tire of sounding their man's praises. When Jim Daly was asked what he thought of Corbett's chances, he promptly answered: "Well, the best way to get at that subject is by cold, hard facts. I'll just compare Sullivan and Corbett with men whom each of them has fought. Sullivan took seven rounds to knock out Dominick McCaffrey in Cincinnati and the referee was three days in giving his decision. Jim did up McCaffrey in two rounds. There was seventy-two rounds of the Sullivan-Kilrain fight in New Orleans. Corbett put Kilrain to sleep in six rounds. Sullivan and Jack Burke fought a five-round draw. Burke was knocked out by Jim in three rounds. Charlie Mitchell refused to meet Corbett.

Dr. Ordway of Boston considers Jackson the greatest fighter living. He and his brother were among the passengers on the steamship Columbia, which arrived yesterday. They had crossed the ocean to see the Jackson-Slavin fight, and the interest was well worth the 6000-mile journey, so the brothers Ordway think.

"I have seen many glove contests and prize-ring encounters during the past 20 years," said Mr. Ordway to a World reporter, "but this one laid away everything in that line I ever witnessed. I do not believe two pluckier men ever set foot in a ring. I thought Slavin would win for a certainty. I have been trying ever since the fight to find out what prompted me to bet that way. Peter Jackson out-classed Slavin as the steam yacht outclasses the canal boat. In my opinion the dark fellow is the greatest fighter living to-day not barring Sullivan. He is simply a wonder, having skill, pluck, and tremendous hitting powers. After the fight he was as modest as could be and when I left London he was 'still the lion of the hour.'"—Boston paper.

Jews and Home Rule.
A curious point that has been overlooked in the so-called Jewish aspects of the present general election is referred to by the Jewish Chronicle. This is that the credit for the initiative in the cause of Jewish emancipation belongs to the old Irish House of Commons which was abolished at the union, and which Mr. Gladstone would now resuscitate. As early as 1745 a bill for the naturalization of persons professing the Jewish religion was introduced into the Irish parliament. This was the first measure of its kind to see the light in the British Isles, and it was passed within a week of its introduction. Unfortunately the Irish Peers, unlike their English colleagues of a later date, were not so liberal as the Commons and threw out the bill. Nothing daunted, the Ministry again brought the measure forward in the following year, and in order to show the determined spirit in which they had set their hands to the work, the Commons carried it without a division in three days. The Peers, however, were equally resolved, and once again the bill was defeated. In 1746 a similar fate befell the bill. Nothing more was heard of the movement, and it was not until six years later that Mr. Pelham, in London, made a like attempt to emancipate the Jews with very much the same result. Our contemporary notes that we have still in the Anglo-Jewish community a relic of this early attempt to emancipate the Jews in the shape of a Board of Deputies, which was started in 1746 as a "Committee of Diligence" to watch the progress of the Irish bill, and to assist Collage Green to agitate against a stubborn and intolerant House of Peers.

Cut the Priest's Throat.
BURGOS, July 30.

While Mass was being celebrated in the cathedral to-day a small man in threadbare clothes entered and knelt near the altar. He remained on his knees a little time, apparently praying, and then sprang to his feet and ran up the steps to the priest. The priest turned and started to flee, but the small man caught him by the vestments and drew a razor across his face. Worshippers near the altar ran to the rescue.


Two persons seized the man, but before they could restrain him he had drawn a razor across the priest's throat. He then turned on the men who were trying to pinion him and slashed one of them on the neck and the other on the arm. Both let go and the man dropping his razor, ran down the middle aisle. Near the door an old peasant woman caught him by the arm and dragged him to the floor, where she held him, until a policeman, attracted by the shrieks of the women in the congregation, came to her aid and arrested him.

The priest lay in his blood at the altar, until a physician came and sewed up his throat. He was unconscious from loss of blood when borne home, and cannot live through the night. The police have learned that before entering the cathedral the assassin went to the archbishop's house for the ostensible purpose of soliciting alms. He behaved so peculiarly that the servants refused to let him enter and eventually closed the door in his face. When asked his motive the assassin merely said that the priest and archbishop were not fit to live because they deceived the people. The police say he is either an anarchist or a madman.

The death of a fireman and the injury to an engineer who sat down on the track and were struck by a train a few days ago on the Chicago division of the Pan-Handle shows how careless railroad men sometimes become. The same kind of an accident was narrowly averted on the Indianapolis division of the Pennsylvania a few days ago. One of the best known engineers on the division and his fireman sat down on the track while waiting for a train and both dropped asleep. Fortunately the engineer of the meeting train saw them in time to stop and their lives were saved.
