**Repairing the Passenger Car.**  
The new passenger car on the K. N. R. which was so badly burned last winter, is undergoing further repairs, and the "Old Jersey" is again doing service in its place.

**Religious Census of Kent County.**  
In Kent out of a population of 23,845 there are 17,136 Roman Catholics; 3,786 Presbyterians; 1,855 Church of England; 930 Methodists; 626 Baptists, and 62 all others.

**Harbor Buoys not yet out.**  
When the Blondel was wrecked through neglect in not putting out the harbor buoys the attention of the authorities was called to the matter, but it seems to have had no effect as some of the buoys have not yet been put out. The shipowners of this port have good ground for complaint in this matter.

**Accident.**  
Captain Williams, of the bark Saca, met with a painful accident last Friday. While descending into the hold of his vessel the ladder slipped, and he was thrown to the bottom, striking his back on a beam. He had to be carried into his cabin, where he has since remained unable to move. It is feared his spine has been injured.

**Application for a Speedy Trial.**  
Sylvain Babane, who is lying in jail, committed for trial on charge of forging fishery bounty applications, has applied for trial under the Speedy Trials Act. Judge Landry appointed Wednesday of last week at the Court House here, as the time and place of trial, but Mr. Sayre, who appeared for the prosecution, stated that he was not prepared, and the trial was adjourned. Babane has since withdrawn his application, and the case will not be taken up until next July term of the county court, when it will be tried before a jury.

**Rods Made by Electricity.**  
The establishment of Mr. Robert O'Shaughnessy is a place well worthy of a visit at this season of the year. Within the past four weeks Mr. O'Shaughnessy has placed an electric motor in his store and he is now making fishing rods by electricity. This step was necessitated by his rapidly increasing business. **Yellow Fever at Santos.**  
The crew of the bark Saca, direct from Santos, Brazil, tell fearful tales of the ravages of yellow fever in that city. The Saca remained there about ten weeks, and in that time no less than seventy captains and about seven hundred sailors were carried off by the disease. Among the citizens mortality was proportionately greater. On one occasion, twenty runaway sailors took refuge in a lumber yard to spend the night. In the morning eight of their number were dead. The victims are carried away from the hospitals and buried without coffins and without ceremony. It is difficult to procure laborers, and the streets are blocked with all kinds of merchandise awaiting shipment. An immense amount is daily lost, destroyed and stolen. The Saca lost one of her crew from the disease.
