A Bird in Her Stomach.
FALL RIVER, May 22.—Little Victoria Berube, the 6-year-old daughter of a French-Canadian laborer, has been an invalid for two years or more, every thing she ate or drank causing her intense pain. She died Saturday afternoon in terrible agony, but on the morning before she expired, she vomited blackish matter, and also a reddish substance, three inches long, which, upon examination, proved to be a half-hatched chicken or bird.
Dr. Casgrain, the attending physician, put the bird in alcohol. He considers it possible that a half-hatched egg might have been boiled and the girl might have eaten it. During his 18 years of practice he has never known of a similar case. The girl died of gastro-enteritis, caused by the presence of the bird in her stomach.

Mr. H. H. Cook, of Central Chebogue, N. S., has a Shropshire lamb that weighed 55 lbs. when 47 days old. In other words that lamb is accumulating mutton for its owner at the rate of about 1 lb. per day.

A case without parallel, at least in the medical record of Chicago is that of James Grant a lineman for the Chicago Telephone company, who was driven insane by an electric shock last Monday afternoon while talking through a telephone in the branch office at the corner of Fortieth and Lake streets. He is now in the detention hospital a raving maniac, strapped down to the bed, with two men guarding him. Grant is 34 years old and lives with his family at Fortieth and Lake streets. He is a large robust man and has been in the employ of the company for some time in the capacity of lineman, and was a thoroughly competent workman. No mistakes have ever occurred with his work and the remarkable accident which has befallen him cannot be accounted for. Mr. Grant is a native of Antigonish, N. S.

Leave Bass River on Thursday and go to Molus River, down the Northwest to St. Louis and Kouchibouguac, remaining at Kouchibouguac during Friday forenoon, then back through Richibucto to Kingston, where he will remain until the following Tuesday.
Leaving Kingston on Tuesday morning, May 10, he will go through Chockpish, thence by Shore Road to Buctouche, standing there on Wednesday. Thursday morning he will go up Buctouche River, to Mill Creek. Friday morning he will go to South Branch, thence through Galway to Kingston. Making the above circuits each alternate week during season.

The following report of arbor day proceedings, kindly furnished by a friend, came to hand too late for our last issue.
Arbor day was duly observed by the teachers and scholars of the Richibucto Grammar School. The change from the routine work of every day school life was by the young folk greatly enjoyed. The forenoon was spent in the ornamentation and general improvement of the school grounds by the planting of trees, etc. At two o'clock the parents and friends of the children were invited to an entertainment when the following programme was well rendered by the scholars of the various departments giving evidence of much painstaking on the part of their teachers.
Songs.—My Own Canadian Home, Summer Rain, Spring, God Save the Queen.
Recitations.—Lessons from Flowers, Mottoes, Taking in their Sleep, The Aged Tree Planter, Symbolism of Flowers, The Days Eye, (Dialogue), The Flower Fairies, Who Stole the Apples, The Little Beggar's Button-hole Bouquet, In Flower Land, The May Queen. After which Geo. V. McInerney, Esq., one of the trustees, gave an address in his usual pleasing style, followed by a few remarks from Rev. J. Seller and a speech from John T. Caie, Esq.

One pleasing feature of the day was the two beautiful flags the "Union Jack" and the "Dominion Ensign," making their first appearance on the school grounds silently impressing the lesson of loyalty and patriotism as the children heartily sang "God Save the Queen" and "My Own Canadian Home." These flags costing about \$14.00 are the property of the school, being purchased from the proceeds of an entertainment given by the children last Christmas. In addition to the flags the sum of \$18.00 has been expended in chemicals and chemical apparatus since principal H. T. Colpitts has taken charge, also from the proceeds of an entertainment given by the scholars. The principal and his assistants Miss I. J. Caie, Miss McRoberts and Miss Crystal are doing excellent work in their various departments, and deserve the appreciation and commendation of all interested for their further endeavors in the improvement of the children and through them obtaining additional school apparatus.
