Found an Aztec City.

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 25.—A party of Mexican laborers while digging in the extension of the Santa Cruz canal yesterday came upon one of the strangest of the old Aztec cities. They struck the first ruin in cutting through the desert about twenty feet below the surface, where it had doubtless been covered up by sand storms. Everything about the old buildings had been wonderfully preserved owing to the alkali in the sands. The first building was a triangular structure. The roof, which had doubtless been thatched had caved in, but the wooden pieces of which it was held together were sound, although put in a thousand years ago. They were pulled out of the old walls and are on exhibition at Tucson. The building was of stone, but the entire width was made in sections and held together by a kind of cement. There were eighteen bodies in the building, all of them of medium size and their flesh was mummified.

—The executive Committee of the Kent Co. Sabbath School Association will meet in the Presbyterian manse at Harcourt, on Tuesday, April 5th, at 2 p. m., standard time. Rev. F. A. Wightman, secretary.

—A public temperance meeting will be held in the Temperance Hall, Richibucto, on Thursday evening, April 7th, commencing at 7:30. Several clergymen, whose names will appear in next week's REVIEW, will address the meeting.

—At a special communication of Lodge St. Andrew, held in the Masonic Hall, last Monday evening, Most Worshipful Grand Master Thomas Walker of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick presided. After the work of the institution had been finished the members repaired to the Kent Hotel to partake of a supper given by the Lodge in honor of the Grand Master's visit. Philip's tables were fitted up in the most inviting style. The toast drunk to the health of "our guest" was most eloquently responded to by Dr. Walker. Dr. Doherty, Wm. D. Carter and Rev. Mr. Haekenley responded to "the professions." The feasting and toasting was kept up until midnight, when the members left for their respective homes, voting it one of the most pleasant evenings spent for a long time.

—A gentleman well known in Richibucto and throughout the province of New Brunswick, died at Keyport, N. J., on Monday the 21st inst. It was William H. Crozier, a son of the late Thomas Crozier, who for many years conducted an extensive dry goods business in the city of St. John. Deceased was for a long time in the employ of Daniel & Boyd, of St. John. He afterwards went to New York, but returned about three years ago, and entered the employ of George K. McLeod as storekeeper here. His failing health compelled him to give up his position, and about six weeks ago removed to New Jersey, and took up his residence with his brother, Rev. F. B. Crozier, rector of St. Mary's church, Keyport. The remains were brought to St. John, and there interred in the Rural Cemetery. Mr. Crozier leaves a wife and two little daughters. They have the sympathy of their many friends in Richibucto.

—The past week has been a most exciting one in sporting circles in and around Richibucto; no less than three trotting races having taken place, and "horse talk" has been about the only conversation heard on the streets. The race-course was a double track on the ice from the ballast wharf—one mile. On Friday last, a race took place between Philip Woods' horse "Dandy," and Dr. Bourque's mare "Kate," best three out of five heats. The race was keenly contested throughout, "Dandy" winning. The race on Saturday, between Geo. W. Robertson's horse "John," and Dr. Bourque's mare "Kate" resulted in an easy victory for the former. One of the prettiest races ever witnessed in Richibucto, was trotted last Tuesday, between A. C. Storer's horse "Prince," and Richard Hebert's horse "Billy." "Billy" took the first and third heats, and "Prince" the second, fourth and fifth, neither horse was at any time more than a few feet ahead of the other. In the fifth heat "Billy" broke badly, thus giving "Prince" the heat and race. The ice was in excellent condition for trotting.

—The many friends of Henry Wilson throughout the county will be pained to hear of his death which occurred at his house in Harcourt last Saturday. Deceased was a son of Mr. John S. Wilson of this place, and was for a number of years in the employ of the Intergovernmental Railway. About a year ago a cancer on his lip began to cause him some uneasiness. He got it removed but it was not long before another appeared on his neck. This was removed by Dr. McLaren, of St. John, but it grew again larger than before. He then visited Montreal, Boston, Philadelphia and New York and consulted with some of the best physicians in these cities but they gave him no hope. Last summer Doctors Bowser and Ferguson, of Kingston, determined to make an attempt to remove the cancer. They were assisted by Dr. Bourque of this place in performing the operation. They were successful in removing it but it soon reappeared and grew constantly larger till his death. Deceased was 54 years of age, a good business man, and enjoyed the respect and confidence of all who knew him. He leaves a wife and several children.

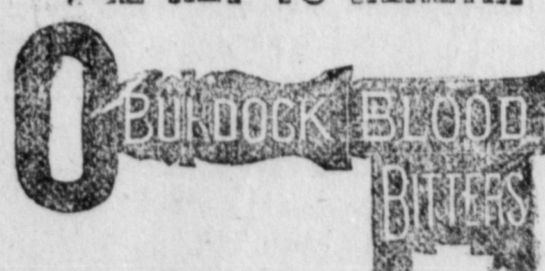
