LOCAL LEGISLATURE.
FREDERICTON, March 24.

The House reconsidered the resolution passed regarding life insurance and adopted this substitute:
Resolved—That it is expedient to impose an annual license fee or tax, payable to the receiver general, upon all insurance companies and associations of any kind having agencies or accepting risks upon the lives of persons within the province, or transacting business of life or endowment insurance therein as the sole object of their organization, or as incidental to other purposes, or their organization, whose principal office and organization is not within the province, of \$250, and of all similar companies and associations whose principal office and organization is within the province, of \$100 each.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell then moved the following, which was adopted: "Resolved—That it is expedient to impose an annual license fee or tax, payable to the receiver general, upon all special or travelling agents, or persons other than persons and agents, who for one year prior to their employment as such agents had, and while so employed, continued to have an office or place of business in the province, soliciting applications for insurance, on behalf of life insurance companies or associations of any kind doing a business of life or endowment insurance, of \$100 each."

On motion of Mr. Phinney the committee on the Balcom draft was instructed in conjunction with and in addition to the present inquiry, to inquire and report upon the circumstances connected with a certain draft for the sum of \$536 or thereabouts, drawn by Balcom on Chief Commissioner Ryan in the year of 1888, and paid by the department of public works in 1889; also to inquire and report upon the "balance, \$139.30," in Joseph A. Balcom's account on page 108 of the auditor general's report for 1891, and the balance due by the said Balcom to the board of works.

Died at the Age of 116 Years.
GLEN GARDNER, N. J., March 24, 1892.—Mrs. Margaret Ray, colored, died Monday at the age of 116 years from the effects of grip. She was born in Belvidere, Warren county, N. J., August 14, 1776, and had lived in Warren and Hunterdon counties ever since. She had never travelled on a railroad train, but with her husband walked to Philadelphia and back, 120 miles, when she was more than sixty years old, and carried an infant with them. She had been totally blind for two years, but her faculties were otherwise unimpaired.

She was married in 1803 to Henry Ray, who fought in the war of 1812. He died in 1871, being 101 years old.
