

LOCAL NEWS

PICNIC IN KINGSTON.—A grand picnic will be held in Kingston, on Wednesday, August 2nd, for the purpose of raising funds for the new Public Hall. A good time may be expected. See advertisement later.

COUNTY COURT.—The case of George W. Roberts vs. Philip O'Brien, resulted in a verdict for plaintiff for \$219.00. The trial of George Roberts on a charge of stealing a snelt net from Alexander Robertson, was then begun under the provisions of the Speedy Trials Act. Judge Landry found the prisoner guilty, and sentenced him to three months in the common jail with hard labor. Court then adjourned sine die.

ATTEMPT AT BURGLARY.—An attempt was made to break and enter Messrs. J. & T. Jardine's store last Monday night. The lower window, sash and all, was torn away, but the iron bars across the inside prevented the perpetrator from gaining admission. An attempt was then made to get in at the upper window with no better success. This is the third case of burglary at Kingston within a few days. Is it not time some attempt was made to find out who the perpetrators are and to bring them to justice?

MARRIED IN VANCOUVER.—The Vancouver World of June 28th says: F. M. Cowperthwaite, principal of the Central school, will be married at 7.30 o'clock this evening to Miss Kate McDougall, third assistant in the same school. The ceremony, which will be of a private nature, will be performed by Rev. E. D. McLaren. Showers of congratulations will pour down upon Mr. and Mrs. Cowperthwaite after the event has been solemnized, as both have hosts of admiring friends in the city. The pupils of the school have not been unmindful of the approach of the day. Mr. Cowperthwaite lived in Richibucto for a number of years. His first wife was Miss Winifred McDougall, of this town.

NORMAL SCHOOL APPLICANTS.—The examinations for admission to the Normal School under the new regulation were held at Fredericton, St. John, Moncton, St. Stephen, Chatham, Bathurst, Campbellton, Woodstock and Andover yesterday. About four hundred persons came up for examination at the different places. The following Kent County students were examined at Moncton:— M. Emma Chrystal, 2nd class, Harcourt, Lulu E. BODY FOUND.—Mr. Robert J. Dysart of Coacagne, sends us the following:—"On Wednesday morning, 28th ult., as a number of people were coming across from Shediac Island to church at Grand Digue, they discovered the body of a man floating in the water, mid-way between the island and the beach. The corpse was accordingly brought to the shore.

Coroner Wm. Johnston was then summoned, a jury impanelled, and after a careful examination of the remains, the following verdict was returned:—"We agree after examining the body and hearing the evidence, that the man found was drowned, but cannot tell how, or by whom the act was done." The body was not much decayed, although it had apparently been in the water for a long time. It was evidently that of a young man, probably between eighteen and twenty years of age, and of a medium size. Identification would have been almost impossible, from the fact that the flesh of the face had entirely disappeared, the left hand had also been devoured to the wrist, while the right, which remained intact, held a mitten firmly in its grasp. His underclothing was made of white woolen material, overshirt, striped and laced, and trousers of brown Scotch tweed. A large double-bladed jack knife, and a revolver, (a seven shooter) were found in his hip-pocket. The whole appearance of the man would indicate him to have been a fisherman, but how the poor fellow came to such a sad end, who he was, or where he came from, is still a mystery. The body was interred here in the Episcopal burying-ground.

The body is supposed to be that of a man named Crossman, who was drowned at West Cape, P. E. I.

HARCOURT SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK.—According to announcement by hand bill, a meeting was held at Harcourt with a view to organizing a Sunday School Convention, including schools of Harcourt and West Weldford.

The well-known workers, Rev. A. Lucas, Field Secretary, and S. J. Parsons, were present. The meeting was opened with prayer, and Scripture reading, led by Mr. Lucas. As the scholars formed the larger number present, Mr. Lucas decided that the matter of organization be laid aside for the present and we adapt our exercises to the scholars, till more older people come in. He therefore led these scholars through a valuable exercise of New Testament geography leading up to the lessons which are now occupying the schools.

After another hymn, Mr. Parsons illustrated the use of the blackboard, and spoke of better records. In the evening session Rev. F. Wightman led the opening exercises and Mr. Lucas proceeded to expound Parish S. S. organization. Wightman, Dunn, and Humphrey. It was moved by Mr. Wightman, seconded by Mr. Humphrey that we proceed to organization. This being carried, the uniform constitution was read and adopted. Regrets were expressed that the West Weldford Sunday schools were not more generally represented and the desire is that those with Harcourt form one district if they are willing.

The following officers were elected:— Andrew Dunn, Pres.; Isaac Humphrey, Vice Pres.; Miss Marion Wathen, Secretary. Next meeting of this convention to be in September or October. Mr. Lucas earnestly urged a good representation of delegates from each school to the Kent County Convention, to be held in Kingston, on the afternoon of 21st and all day of 22nd.

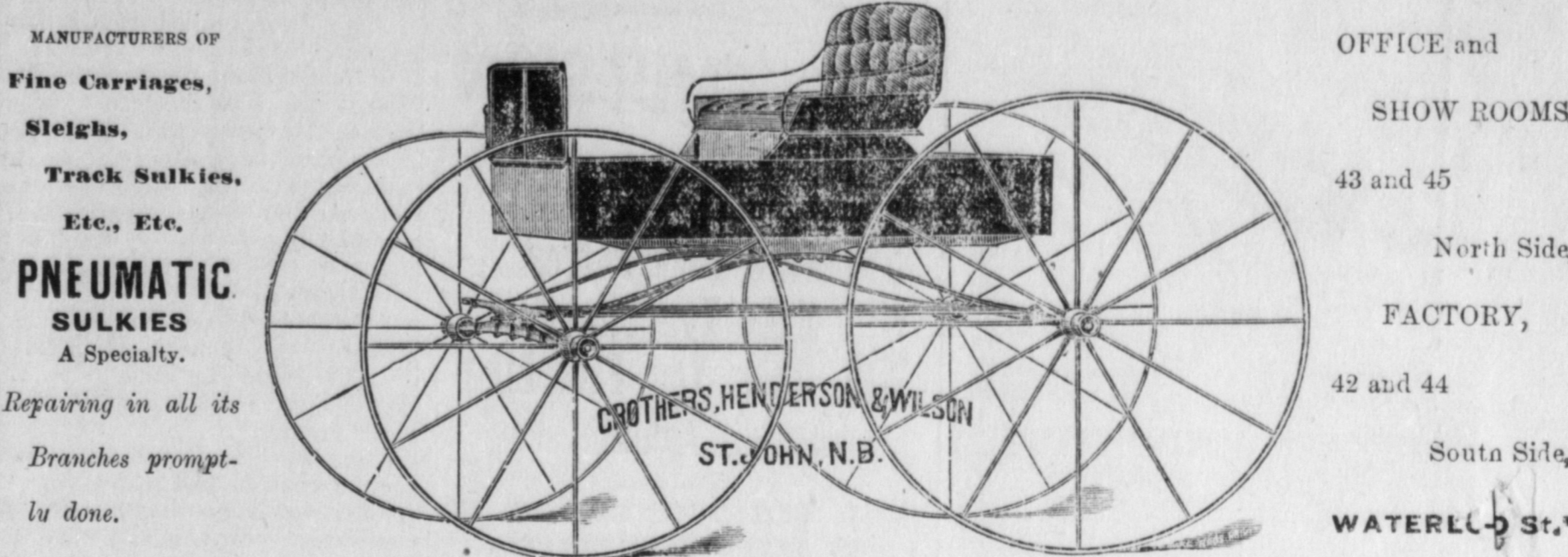
