The councillors were all in attendance, and got through a great deal of work in the five days they were in session. The board compares very favorably with previous boards. Warden Bernard makes an excellent presiding officer. A bye-law was passed providing that hereafter councillors shall be elected for two years, instead of annually. It was decided to continue the midsummer session. The report will be continued next week.

SMELTS.—The smelt business has been making things lively around here. The catch in the main channel has been very large, and the fishermen are happy. On Thursday and Friday, some immense hauls of smelts were taken. One fisherman is said to have made over \$150 in twelve hours. Hauls worth from \$50 to \$100 were of common occurrence. Last Saturday about five tons were driven into the yard of G. W. Robertson at one time. The weather continues all that can be desired, and the smelts caught are large and command the highest prices.

—In the poem on first page—"Her Voice"—for "tan" read "ton." In last verse for "mystic" read "music," and for "beauty's queen" read "music's queen."

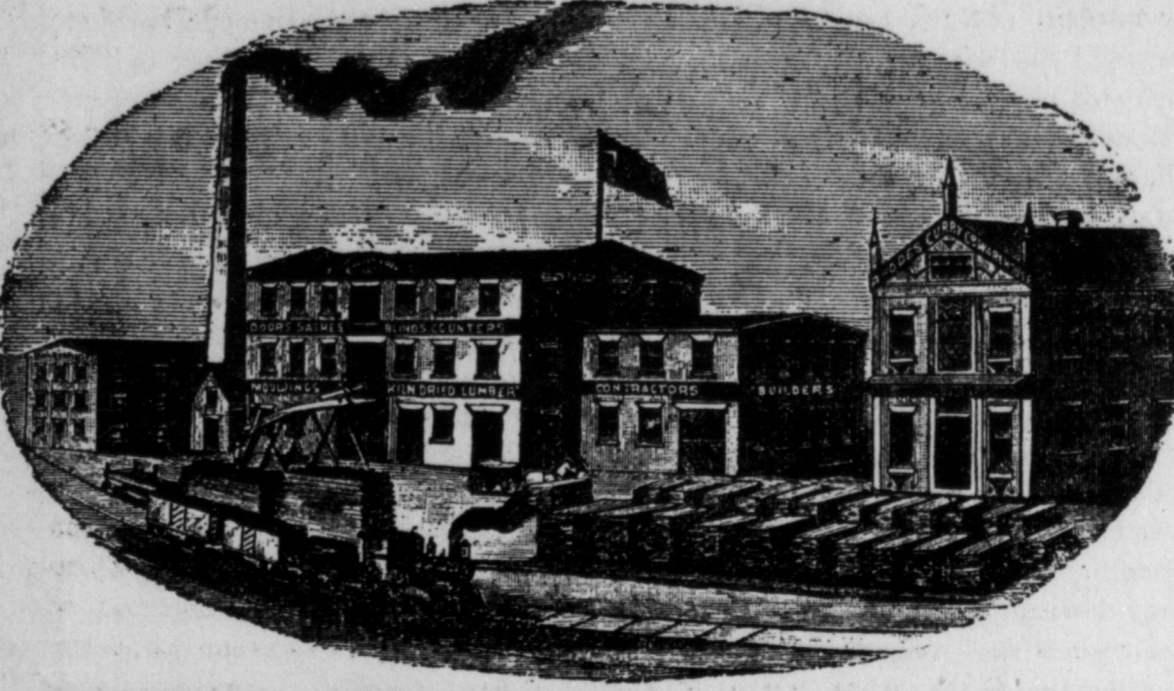
