**Venus Resembles The Earth.**

On the authority of the late Richard A. Proctor, so far as the telescopes and physical researches have yet led, in size in situation and in density, in the length of her seasons and of her rotation, in the figure of her orbit and in the amount of light and heat she receives from the sun, Venus bears a more striking resemblance to the earth than any orb within the solar system. In fact, there is no other pair of planets between which so many analogies can be traced as between Venus and the earth. Uranus and Neptune are similar in many respects, but they differ in at least as many.

Jupiter and Saturn are, in a sense, the brother giants of the solar system, while the dwarf orbs, Mars and Mercury, present many striking points of similarity, but between none of these pairs can we trace so many features of resemblance as those which characterize the twin planets, Venus and Terra. Had Venus a moon like the earth, we might doubt whether, in the whole universe, two orbs exist which are so strikingly similar to each other. Indeed, it is by no means certain that Venus has not a moon, Montaigne, Rodkier, Herrebon, Montheven and others having seen a body near Venus which presented phases similar to that of the planet, precisely as a satellite would have done. Venus has a day of about 23 hours and 21 minutes, and a year of 224 days and 17 hours nearly.

The distance from the sun is something less than three-fourths of that which separates the sun from us. It is clear that merely in the great proximity of Venus to the sun there is little to render at least a large proportion of her surface uninhabitable by such beings as exist on our earth. In her temperate and sub-arctic regions a climate which we should find well suited to our requirements might very well exist while the polar regions might correspond to our temperate zone, and be the abode of the most active and enterprising race existing upon her surface. On the whole, the Brooklyn Eagle thinks that the evidence we have points very strongly to Venus as the abode of living creatures not unlike the inhabitants of the earth.

**No Mercy To The Jews.**

The latest advices from St. Petersburg and other parts of Russia show that the persecution of the Jews and the inhumanity of the Czar's officials toward that unhappy race are greater than ever before. Six edicts have been issued, aiming to disperse the Jewish subjects of Russia, weaken their position at trading centers and crush out their religion. These edicts are enforced with the utmost rigor in many parts of the empire and with severity everywhere.

The Moscow papers boast that, since the beginning of 1891, 20,000 Jews have been converted to orthodoxy. The unhappy converts, who have been driven to a pretended denial of their religious faith in order to escape intolerable persecution, have been deported to the district of Tcherkosovo, about five miles from Moscow. There they are rigorously governed by priests of the Russian orthodox church, who require them to attend the services of that church and to comply with its various rules, watching narrowly for any sign of evasion or repentance. These priests have entire supervision of the wretched colony; and the alleged converts from Judaism are only allowed leave to return to Moscow upon a certificate from the priests vouching that the convert holding such document is assured in the faith of the orthodox church.

**The Time to Eat.**

There has been a good deal of discussion as to the best time for eating certain articles of food. For instance, we are advised not to eat meat late in the day, not to take fruit just before retiring, and to avoid tea and coffee in the evening if a wakeful night is not desired.

Men of mature years and good stomachs are not devoting much time to studying these questions. They will tell you that as ermelon never tasted better than on a dark night when the dog was chained and the owner of the patch sleeping after the weary labors of the day.

Apples never were so sweet as when an entrance was surreptitiously effected into the rear end of the orchard and the invader punished the stolen fruit with an assurance that the proprietor was not within in eyeshot. Cakes, pie, and preserves were eaten wherever the eyes of watchful and solicitous parents were temporarily off duty. **Slave Traffic Not Dead.**

A San Francisco despatch says that the tramp steamer Montserrat, which recently carried a cargo of Gilbert Islanders to Guatemala coffee plantations, has now been bought by the slave dealers and will be used to transport by wholesale these ignorant South Sea Islanders to the unhealthy coffee plantation of Central America. The Montserrat left San Francisco, December 4th for Guatemala. She had on board Capt. W. H. Ferguson, the man who brought over 500 Gilbert Islanders on the brig Tahiti, and whom sickness forced to stay in California. He thus escaped the fate of all on the brig, which foundered off the Mexican coast. The new owners of the Montserrat are the men who lately brought a load of islanders to Guatemala and made a large profit on the cargo. Ferguson's presence on board is accounted for by a member of the former expedition, who has been approached within ten days, with a proposition to ship for another trip when the steamer gets back here and fits out for the raid on the peaceful homes of the South Pacific. Ferguson's errand is to secure the aid of some of the interpreters and natives who went to the south coast plantations as whippers-in for another big lot of slaves. The last cargo was not picked up without difficulty and the natives Ferguson intends to take back are to be used to spread glowing reports of the life of the natives in the Samoan and Caroline groups before the Gilberts are touched at, but little is expected from the former islanders, because the natives are not a laboring class. The four masted schooner Alexander now idle in Oakland creek, is also reported to be under charter to the slave dealers. The king of the Gilbert islanders is always hard up and the slave dealers pay him handsomely for his influence in getting laborers. Unless England, which lately assumed the protectorate over the Gilberts steps in and forbids this blackbirding, the islanders will be practically depopulated. The islanders are promised good wages and return transportation, but two out of three fall victims to deadly fevers and change of climate.

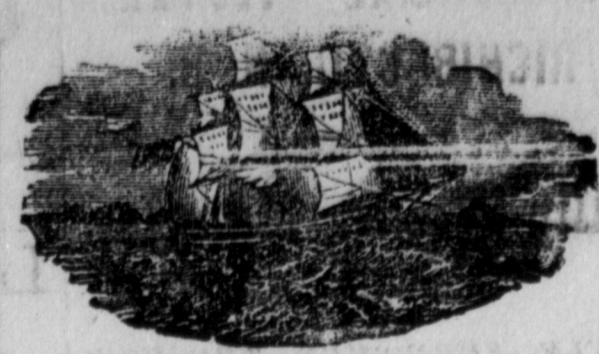
