Fishery inspector, R. A. Chapman seized two barrels of fresh lake trout in the city market yesterday. The fish, belonged to an Acadian from Gloucester county. The close season for these fish is from September 15th to May 15th and violators of the law are subject to a fine of \$20 for each fish should the fishery department wish to take such proceedings, but it is usual to impose a fine of \$20. The top and bottom of the barrels contained tom-cods, being evidently placed there to hide the trout. The owner of the fish kept out of sight after the seizure. The fishery department will be communicated with as to the disposal of the fish.—Times

Some months ago Joseph Pelletier, of Madawaska, was arrested for destroying the tombstone on his wife's grave in the Catholic graveyard there. He was tried at the session of the Supreme Court in September, and the jury rendered a verdict of guilty. As it was late in the evening Judge King deferred sentence until the following morning. When the court assembled Pelletier failed to connect. A bench warrant was issued for his arrest. A few days ago it was reported he was concealed in his own house, and Constables Maxime and Joseph Martin proceeded to arrest him. Maxime rather foolishly ascended the stairs to a dark room, when the first thing he was aware of he was struck on the head with a bar of iron and knocked down senseless. Martin at once sprang to his assistance, when his head was split open by the same instrument in the hands of Pelletier, who then escaped to the American side, where he still is.—Gleaner.


