GENERAL N. B.

English migration agents say that the present year will show the largest list of emigrants for Canada ever recorded.

An explosion occurred in a coal mine at King, four miles from Comco, Col., last week. Twenty-seven men were killed.

A band of brigands made a descent upon a church at Page, Spain, Friday. They stabbed two priests to death, sacked the church and then escaped.

It is reported that Lord Viscount Wolsley at present commander of the forces in Ireland will succeed Lord Stanley as the Governor-General of Canada.

Next Saturday's Canadian Gazette will contain an order in council renewing the modus vivendi with reference to the Atlantic fisheries for the season of 1893.

It has been officially announced that the tariff of canal tolls adopted for the year 1893, puts an end to all discrimination against vessels, merchandise or citizens of the United States.

Quebec Chronicle: For the first time within it, it is claimed, the recollection of the present generation, the Montmorency Falls are frozen solid, and no water is passing over the cataract.

It is stated authoritatively that when the returns of the I. C. R. for the six months ending December have been reckoned, the deficit in the management of the I. C. R. will be wiped out totally.

The spinning mill of Ohaka, Japan, was burned on Dec. 29th with a loss of 125 lives. Most of the unfortunate victims were young girls. Two hundred and seventy houses in the vicinity of the mills which caught fire from the sparks were destroyed.

The first of the great skating races for the championship of the world, between Fred C. Breen of St. John and Harold Hagen of Christiania, Norway, came off last Saturday in the Normanna Skating Club rink, Minneapolis, and was won easily by Hagen. The second one was also won by Hagen.

According to cable despatches, Blake's speeches are in great demand. On January 24 he visits Glasgow at the invitation of the Scotch Liberals, and on January 27 will visit Bath. In February he will probably speak in one of the London constituencies and will probably visit Hull at a later date, to keep a promise made several months back.

The London Morning public has an interview with Mr. W. T. Stead, in which the editor explains his recent experiences with spirit writing. He gave it as his conviction that before many months the immortality of the soul and the possibility of communicating with the dead would be facts established by scientific proof.

COUNTY COURT.—The January term of the County Court opened here Tuesday, Judge Landry presiding. The following grand jurors were in attendance and duly sworn viz. Hugh M. Ferguson, foreman, Dosithee Richard, James F. Atkinson, Wm. Robertson, Donnelly McDermott, Robert Law, Lazar Guimund, James Jardine, Terence Curran, Joseph I. Robichaud, Robert Cochrane, John McInerney, Wm. McBeath, John B. Wright, Martin Lanigan, Thomas Bell, Thomas G. Dickinson, Martin Flanagan, David McAlmon, Richard O'Leary, Benedict Hains, Sylvester Wathen, and Urbain Babineau. There were two criminal cases before the Court: The Queen vs. Geo. W. Robertson on a charge of fraudulently disposing of the schooner "Henry Swan" held in trust by him for Samuel L. Storer; and The Queen vs. Alexander Maillet on a charge of uttering forged fishery bounty orders. In the Queen vs. Robertson the grand jury found no bill. The trial of Alexander Maillet was postponed till next April on application of J. D. Phinney counsel for accused.

The only civil cause before the Court was the case of Wilfred D. Robichaud vs. George E. Irving. The cause was undefended and damages were assessed by the jury at \$51.49.

On Wednesday Mr. Sayre moved in the matter of the Queen on complaint of Geo. H. Morton vs. Robert McPherson on affidavits showing delay in the taxation of costs, for a new order for payment. Mr. Phinney opposed application and contended that under the circumstances the costs should be taxed before an order of payment could be made. Ordered that costs be retaxed on notice to be given to Morton, and paid within twenty days after demand.

Mr. Phinney also called the attention of the Court to the manner in which the grand jury had been called in the Queen vs. Robertson, whereby one of the jurors whose name was third on the list had been dropped from the list and was not sworn, while the juror whose name was last on the list was sworn, and sat on the case.

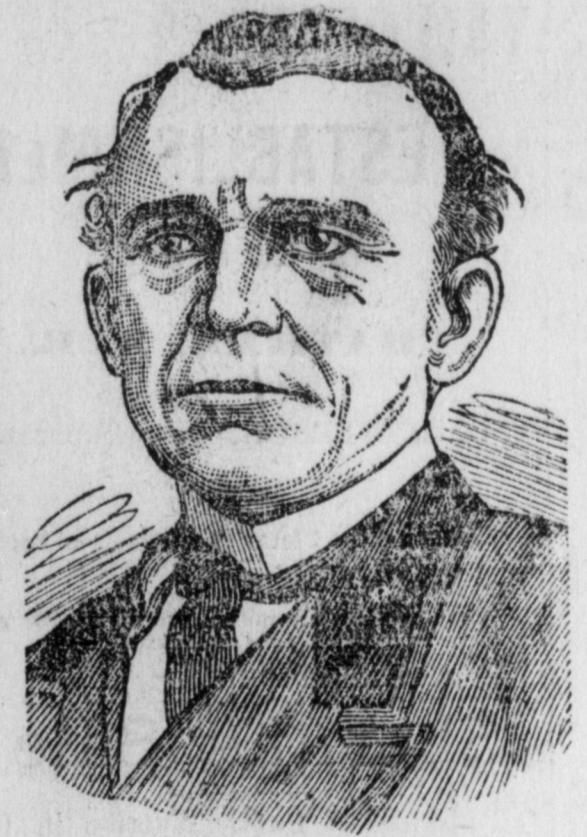
