HOUSE BURNED.—The dwelling house of Martin Walsh, at East Branch, St. Nicholas River, was destroyed by fire on the evening of the 8th inst. The furniture was totally destroyed. No insurance.

AN ACCIDENT.—While A. Taylor was working with an axe on the sawdust wharf Brown's mill one day last week, an axe in the hands of another workman flew off the handle, striking Taylor on the forehead, and giving him a severe gash. Dr. Bourque stitched and dressed the cut, and the wounded man is able to be at work again.

BODY RECOVERED.—The body of Duncan R. Campbell, of Bass River, Kent County, who was drowned at Falls, Maine, on the 12th of May, was found on the 8th instant under some logs near the place where the accident occurred. Deceased was thirty-seven years of age. He leaves two little daughters, aged respectively eight and seven. He was insured against accident in the Travellers' Insurance Co.

DOMINION DAY CELEBRATION.—A big day may be looked for on the first, as the committee in charge are leaving no stone unturned to give the people of Richibucto and vicinity a thorough days sport. It is to be hoped the public at large will assist in this worthy cause by their cheerful and liberal contributions. The St. Louis brass band will be in attendance. The display of fireworks will excel anything of the kind heretofore shown in Richibucto.

ENTERTAINMENT.—The Sisters of Convent de Notre Dame, St. Louis, will give a concert and entertainment on the evening of July 3rd. A French piece "La Perle Cochée" and one in English, "The Precious Pickle," will be given by the students. Also music, tableaux etc. The St. Louis brass band will be in attendance. THE THUNDER STORM.—The thunder storm of Sunday evening, was the most violent that has visited this section for some time. The house of Keady O'Leary was struck by the lightning, but fortunately not much damage was done. The electric fluid entered through the chimney and passed out the front window, which was open. The shock burst open the stove doors, and Mrs. O'Leary and her daughter, who were in the kitchen were struck down unconscious. When they recovered, the daughter found that the sole of her boot had been torn off by the stroke. Mrs. O'Leary's leg was slightly injured. One of the posts in the yard of the Commercial hotel was struck and shattered.

A BRUTAL ASSAULT.—A young Indian lad, while working in Walker's mill at Bass River, last Thursday, was assaulted and brutally beaten by a young man named Robinson. It appears that a dispute arose between the two about some trifling matter, and Robinson throwing down a deal which he was carrying, struck the Indian boy a blow on the head, knocking him senseless. Drs. Keith and Ollouque were summoned, but it was several hours before the boy began to show signs of consciousness, and then he went into convulsions. A warrant was issued by Stipendiary Richardson to apprehend Robinson, but it is said he has left the country. The boy is improving and it is thought he will recover.

BARK UNITY.—The following is from the Buenos Ayres Herald of May 7:—Bahia Blanca, 29th April, 1893.

To the editor of the Buenos Ayres Herald, Dear Sir.—I saw in your valuable paper of Thursday, April 21, an account of the barque Unity, and allow me to tell you that your correspondent was not correct. It is true that we had a most tedious passage and met with very severe gales. Captain McLaughlin was struck with paralysis on Saturday, April, 15th. Then I took charge and brought the vessel into port. I neither ran the vessel ashore nor did I have the help of so called pilot or fishermen till I got within six miles of the pier. 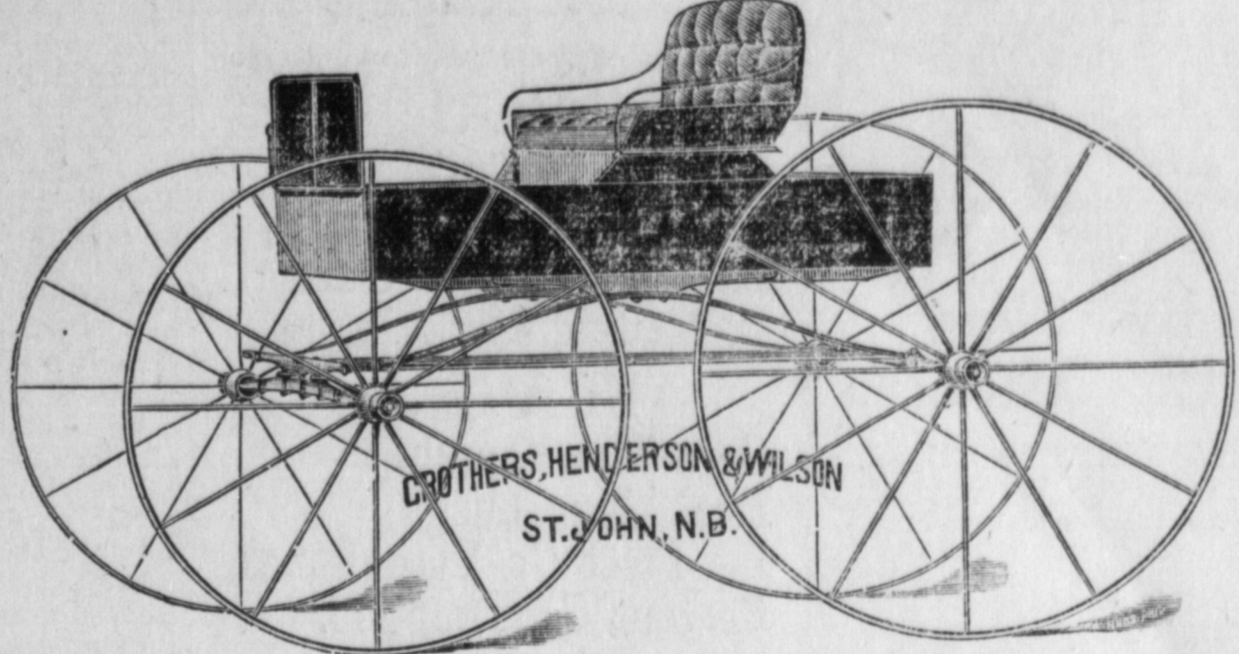
