

LOCAL NEWS

POST OFFICE CHANGED.—The post office at Cornierville, Cocagne River, has been removed to the Goguen office. Mr. Fidele LeBlanc is the new postmaster.

VITAL STATISTICS.—The report of Robert Hutchinson, Deputy Registrar of births, marriages and deaths, shows 362 births, 200 deaths and 67 marriages in the County of Kent during the last six months.

ACCIDENT IN THE UNITED STATES.—John Bourque, son of Mr. Samuel Bourque, was killed by a railway train at Dalton, Mass., on the 2nd inst. Mr. Bourque formerly belonged to Cocagne, Kent County.

THE CROPS.—The recent rains have greatly improved the crop prospects, and farmers are in good spirits. The rain came too late to insure a good hay crop, but it will be far above what was expected a few days ago.

REMOVING A MILL.—George McMinn has secured a lease of Yellow-House Point, Richibucto, and is busy removing his mill from Kent Junction. He will set it up on the site of the McLeod mill destroyed by fire two years ago.

WILL REBUILD.—Thomas Burns, whose mill on Hutchinson's point, Kingston, was destroyed by fire a few weeks ago, has decided to rebuild on the old site. He is away purchasing new machinery, and will begin building immediately on his return.

DAMAGED BY FIRE.—A fire started in bushes near the railway track between town and Kingston last Friday, and in a short time extended to the road. The fence of the driving park caught, and, before the fire could be extinguished, the south end was completely destroyed. The loss is heavy. The fire is supposed to have originated from sparks from the Kent Northern locomotive.

LET US HAVE ORDER.—There has been more drunkenness and rowdiness in Richibucto during the last fortnight than has been seen around here for some time. The list of magistrates and officers is large, but they are apparently more for ornament than for use, as no effort is ever made to apprehend the offenders. It is a pity that this place cannot secure the appointment of some good officer who would at least endeavor to preserve order.

THE MAILS.—There is a great deal of dissatisfaction with the present management of the mails. Under the old arrangement the Welford mail left for Richibucto before the arrival of the train from the north, and arrived here early in morning, leaving the northern mail for the afternoon train. Under the present arrangement the mail driver waits for the northern mail and does not reach Richibucto until nearly noon. As the train arrives at about three in the afternoon, there is no reason why the mail from the north should not be left to come by train. It would certainly give much more satisfaction if that arrangement could be made.

COUNTY COUNCIL.—The County Council adjourned Thursday after transacting the ordinary business. At the close of the proceedings a vigorous protest was raised against the additional taxation rendered necessary by recent provincial legislation. The following resolution moved by Councillor McKee was unanimously adopted:—

Whereas, recent legislation by the local Legislature has imposed large burdens upon the various municipalities for the Registrar of Births, Deaths and Marriages the Preservation of the Public Health, Printing, the Education of the Deaf and Dumb, the Education of the Blind, the support of Pauper Lunatics in the Asylum, the maintenance of the Boys' Industrial Home, and shorthand reporting in the courts, and for other purposes—

And Whereas, the taxation upon the county has, in consequence of such legislation, already largely increased, because of the payment of charges which have hitherto been borne by the province, and which are to be still further increased in the future.

Therefore Resolved, that the County Council enters its protest against such objectionable legislation, and calls upon the representatives of the county in the local Legislature to do what they can to effect the repeal of such enactments and prevent the imposition of further burdens of a like character upon the municipalities.

In the midst of the altercation Noyes picked up a large bottle and hit Edgar over the head with it, breaking his neck and crushing his skull in. The murderer was at once arrested and will be tried at the October court.
