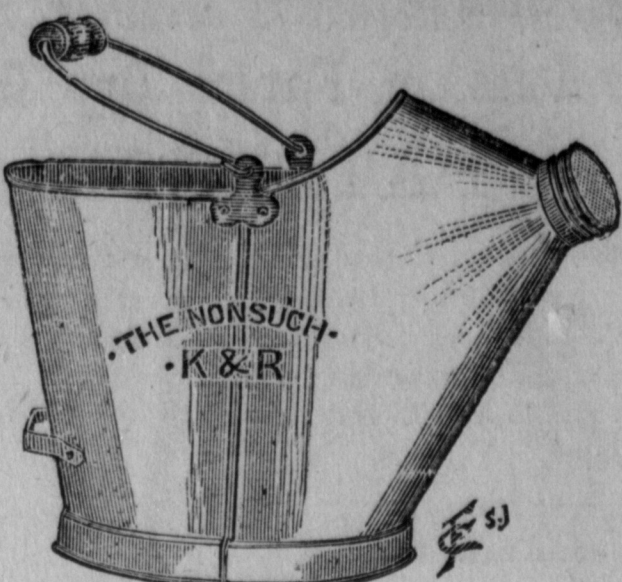

and Kingston drove to Buctouche Sunday

place in aid of the new hall, Kingston, is

in Richibucto Tuesday. He reports affairs
in his parish in a prosperous condition.
The picnic there last week was well at-
tended. The amount realized will clear
the church entirely of debt.—Rev. Mr. Wightman, the new pastor
of Carmarthen St. Methodist church, occu-
pied the pulpit of the church for the first
time last Sunday, preaching to large con-
gregations, both morning and evening.
Last evening a public reception was ten-
dered the new pastor and his wife.—Work-
man.—The body of M. M. Bruce, one of the
three young men drowned last November
was found on the beach near Dalhousie,
Monday. The head and part of one hand
were gone. The store key was found in
one of his pockets, and a Masonic breast-
pin led to the identification. The re-
mains will be interred tomorrow at ten
o'clock.—W. W. McLellan, trackmaster of the
I. C. R., accompanied by Edward Boud-
reau, had a rare day's sport trout fishing
last week on the Barnaby river. They
caught one hundred and eight pounds
weight of trout and two salmon. Wild
animals must be quite numerous in that
section from the accounts they give of
traces of bears, moose and caribou. Mr.
McLellan is an expert with the rod; but a
short time before he captured some fine
trout in Salmon river.—Fire broke out in the Union Hotel,
Shediac, Saturday morning about 4
o'clock. It soon spread to the old post
office, then across the street to Mrs. Car-
lisle's residence and from there to R. W.
Abercrombie's shop and dwelling. It next
caught in Dr. F. White's new house and
shortly after it attacked the Methodist
church. The last house burned was that
occupied by Fishery expert Kempf. The
fire is supposed to be the work of tramps.
Mrs. Carlyle had \$1000 insurance on her
house and some on her furniture.—The grounds of Hon. L. J. Tweedie,
Chatham, were enclosed for the garden
party Thursday by an artificial hedge,
made of bushes and beautifully decorated.
In the evening the grounds were illumi-
nated by 250 Chinese lanterns. Tents and
bowers of green bushes were scattered
around, and it was altogether a fairy-like
scene. There were about a thousand per-
sons on the grounds. There were swings
for the young people, and young and old,
blindfolded, tried to pin the donkey's tail
on. The fireworks in the evening formed
a pleasing feature of the festival.—World.—At noon Saturday lower Lutz street,
Moncton, was the scene of quite a com-
motion. Three women named Beatty,
Murphy, and the latter's daughter, took
possession of the Plain Dealer office, with
the intention of administering a beating
to B. MacDougall, the editor. The reasonof such hostile manifestations on their
part was an article in the Plain Dealer re-
flecting on their character; and the houses
they kept. Editor McDougall wisely
kept out of the way and the three women
were conducted before Magistrate Wort-
man, to whom they poured out their com-
plaint.—Mr. E. H. McAlpine, who went to
Restigouche county to attend the meeting
of the County Court, as crown prosecutor
in a case against Mr. J. T. Windsor, re-
turned home to-day. He did not have any
work to do, as the grand jury found no
bill. The indictment charged Mr. Windsor,
who is the postmaster and a prosperous
business man at New Mills, with opening
a letters and taking therefrom money
orders worth somewhere in the vicinity of
\$150. This money was sent to Mrs. Henry
Pettigrew by her husband, now living in
Wisconsin. The evidence given to the
grand jury showed clearly that Mr. Wind-
sor had not abstracted the money orders
from the letters, but had given them to

His Poems Buried.When Dante Gabriel Rossetti, the En-
glish poet and artist, was a young man he
fell in love with a beautiful girl and mar-
ried her. Having the poet's gift he sang
his love in a series of sonnets to her. His
wife died a very short time after marriage
and by her wish the manuscripts of these
poems were placed in a casket and laid
under her head so that even in the last
sleep they should be as they always had
been—kept beneath her pillow. Years
passed by and Rossetti's fame grew until
every line of his composition became
precious and some of those who prized his
writing most asked him for copies of the
songs that had been buried. He had kept
no copies, or they had been lost. At all
events he could furnish none, and when
they asked him to rewrite the verses he
declared that he was utterly unable to do
so. At last his friends importuned him
for permission to have the original manu-
scripts exhumed. He consented after some
hesitation, and, all the necessary prelimi-
naries having been complied with, the
grave, which had been sealed for eight
years, was opened in the presence of a
wondering few. Then a strange thing was
found. The casket containing the poems
had proven to be of perishable material
and its cover had crumbled away. The
long tresses of the girl had grown after
death and had twined and intertwined
among the leaves of the poet's paper, coil-
ing around the written words of love in a
loving embrace long after death had sealed
the lips and dimmed the eyes that had
made response to that love.
