MR. BODEN ON THE ACADIANS.

In the June number of Donahoe's Magazine, Mr. John Boden draws a pen picture of the Acadians of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. Mr. Boden's information was no doubt derived from personal observation, and in some respects he gives a pretty accurate idea of their cus toms and manner of living. The Acadians, however, are moving along with the times, and they are no longer the simple mistrustful people that the writer would lead his readers to believe. Education has done much within the past few years to remove the feeling of mistrust heretofore borne by them against their Anglo-Saxon neighbors, and they no longer seek to seclude themselves "from the world that lies bethey content to pass away the years in their pastoral pursuits as the writer alleges. They are just as ambitious and of them, like Mr. Boden, have quitted and are quitting the land of their birth to sek fame and fortune in a broader field. Referring to their manner of dress the writer draws a picture which is seldom or never seen at this date. He say :- "The men clothe themselves in the homespun dress in the simplest of plain black gowns woven by themselves, with a deep, snowwhite collar falling half-way to their shoulders which seems to intensify the color of the costume." In one respect, however, the Acadians have not changed. No change has taken place in their deep and reverential attach ment to the faith of their ancestors and feeling in the following words :- "The traveller who enters the valleys in which they dwell may well believe himself in peasant France. Morning, noon and night the Angelus is chimed from the belfry of the church, which is never absent, however | Grangeville. poor the community. It matters not where the Acadians may be-at work in the field or in the shop, at home or by the roadside-at the first sound of the bell the head is bared and bowed and the Angelus piously said. On great feast days, such as Corpus Christi, the Blessed Eucharist is carried in public procession through the main road of the village or the chief street of the town, about whose sides in reverent homage kneel the simple peasants. No man can see these scenes and not feel his heart touched with the faith of the Acadian." The British Metropolis is just now excited over a question of precedence. 
