

LOCAL NEWS.

PRESBYTERY MEETING.—Rev. William Hamilton leaves to-day for Harcourt, to attend a meeting of the Miramichi Presbytery, called to consider the resignation of Rev. J. H. Cameron of his charge at Bass River. Mr. Cameron has been in ill health for some time and his resignation is due to his desire to locate in Manitoba or the North West in the hope that a change of climate may benefit him.

A MOOSE ON THE TRACK.—Passengers on the 10 30 train from Moncton on Saturday were surprised to see a large sized moose keeping time with the train a short distance south of Birch Ridge. He made a rush for the wire fence but was unable to make a break in it, and as the train was too fast, he got behind it and came down to a walk. He was still following when the train went over the grade and left him out of sight.

LOBSTER FISHING.—Lobsters have been very plentiful at some of the factories along the coast and the catch this season promises to be unusually large. Last week the catch was very large at the Point Saph and Little Gully factories, and all the hands were kept busy. Some of the fishermen cleared \$25 and \$30 in a single day. Catches further south have not been as good, but packers all along the coast appear to be well satisfied with the prospects.

BARQUE WM. GORDON.—The barque Wm. Gordon arrived at this port last Friday, from Barbadoes. On the passage, one of the sailors, a Spaniard, attempted suicide by stabbing himself. When found he was lying in a pool of blood with an ugly wound above the heart. The vessel called at Halifax, where the wounded man was placed in the hospital. Coming out of Halifax harbor, she narrowly escaped stranding at Sombro. She will load a cargo of deals for Geo. K. McLeod.

THE BLUEBERRY INDUSTRY.—Dealers in blueberries in this province, are seeking to have the duty removed from the crates. The berries find a ready market in the United States, where they are sent in crates, a number of boxes being contained in each crate. Duty is charged on the crates entering Canada. The blueberry industry is yearly growing in importance. In the north shore, and St. John river counties, it gives employment to a large number of persons, and the government should remove all obstacles in the way of its successful prosecution.

RICHIBUCTO AND P. E. I. FERRY SCHEME.—Senator Poirier of Shediac, accompanied by Dr. DeBertram, of New York, and two other Americans were at Buctouche, Saturday, and drove to Richibucto Cape to inspect the place and get information respecting the condition of the straits at this point during last winter, with a view to pushing forward the Richibucto Cape and P. E. I. Railway Ferry scheme. The party secured boats, and crossed to the Island making soundings at different places along the proposed route. They returned to Moncton by special over the B. & M. Railway, Sunday. Dr. DeBertram, it is said, is heading a movement for the purchase of the B. & M. Railway and the extension of the road to the Cape.

DEATH OF JOHN A. MORRISON.—The death of Mr. John A. Morrison, at Fredericton, Sunday, removes one of the oldest and best known lumber operators in the province. Mr. Morrison was at one time the largest importer of dry goods in the city of St. John, and paid the largest amount of import duties ever paid on any one importation. He advanced largely to Mr. James McPhelin, then carrying on a large lumber business in Buctouche, and when Mr. McPhelin got into financial difficulties Mr. Morrison took charge of the business and ran the McPhelin mill for a number of years on his own account. He afterwards removed to Fredericton, where he has been engaged in the lumber business ever since. His death resulted from a stroke of paralysis. He was seventy three years of age.

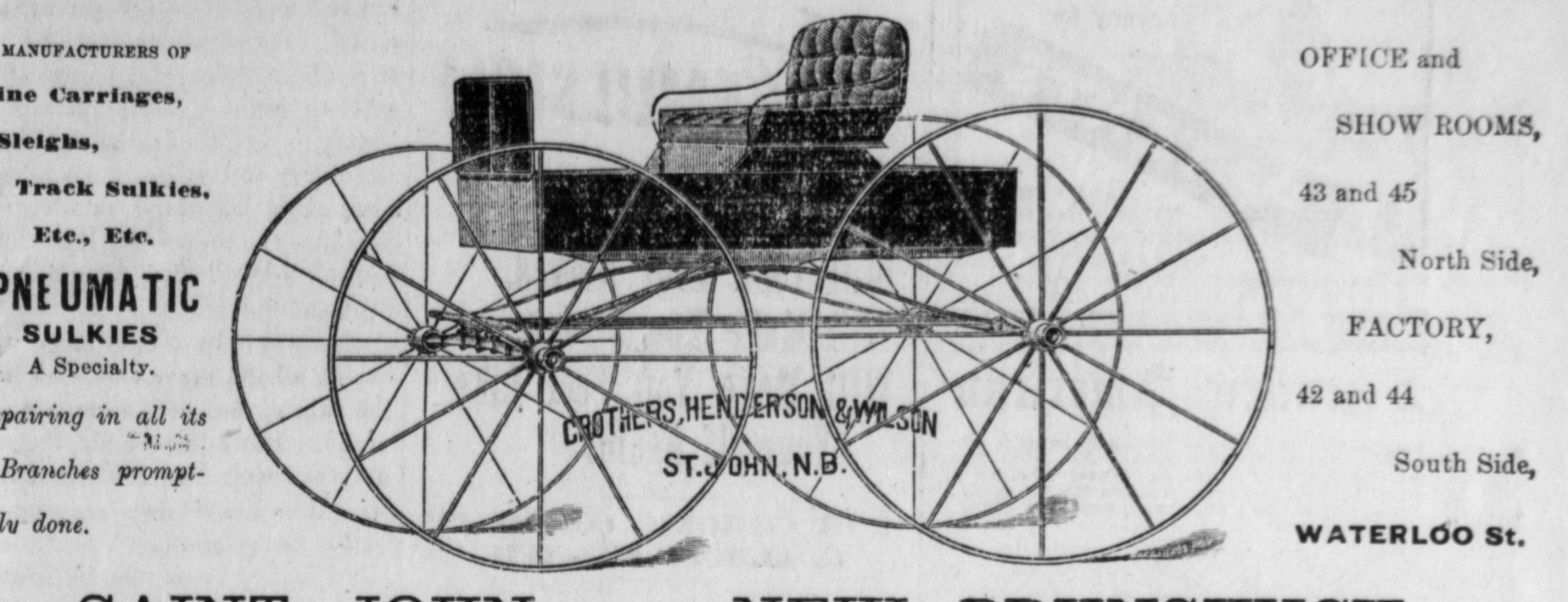

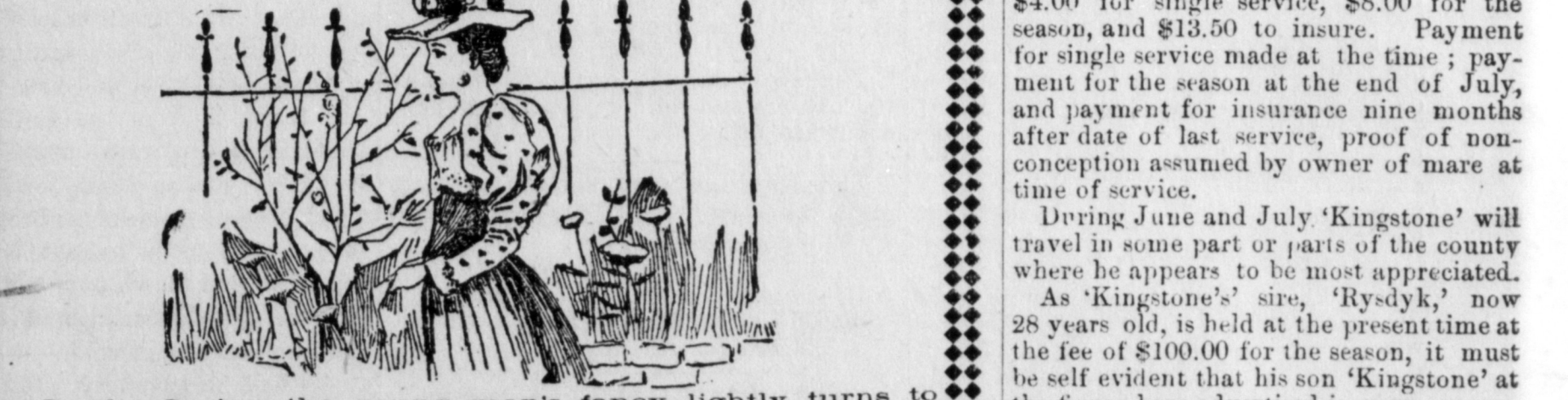
