GENERAL NEWS.

A young man, 22 years old, son of Fee-
mer King, of Howland Ridge, in the parish
of Southampton, was killed on a brow of
logs on the Meduxnekeag river on Monday
the 21st.

It has been decided to open the World's
Fair on Sundays, and last Sunday the big
show was in full blast. The Methodist
church exhibit will be withdrawn from
the fair in consequence of this action.

The exports for the ten months are
\$93,500,000, an increase of \$4,000,000.
The imports were \$97,312,000, an increase
of \$7,000,000. The half duty collected
increased a million and a half.

The Ontario Legislature prorogued on
Saturday. Among the bills passed during
the session was one providing that a
plebiscite be taken in January next on the
advisability of prohibiting by law the im-
portation, manufacture or sale of intoxi-
cating liquors as a beverage.

Another landslide has occurred at Vaer-
dalen, Norway. An extent of land in the
Devanger valley became dislodged and
slid down on the soil below, destroying 22
homesteads and 50 cottages. A vast area
is flooded and many persons are missing,
and it is feared they have perished.

The conservatives of Belfast and neigh-
boring towns made a great demonstration
on the 24th, in Ulster hall in honor of the
Marquis of Salisbury, who urged his
hearers to fight the Gladstone bill but not
to resort to violence. The hall was crowd-
ed, fully 3,000 persons being present, and
the proceedings were marked by intense
enthusiasm.

There are at least 10,000 homeless and
hungry people in East Carroll, Moore-
house, West Carroll and Madison parishes,
Louisiana, and the sufferings and privations
they are undergoing are appalling. Near-
ly the entire north-eastern portion of the
state is under water. Forty-four negroes
were rescued last night in a starving con-
dition, having been without food for four
days.

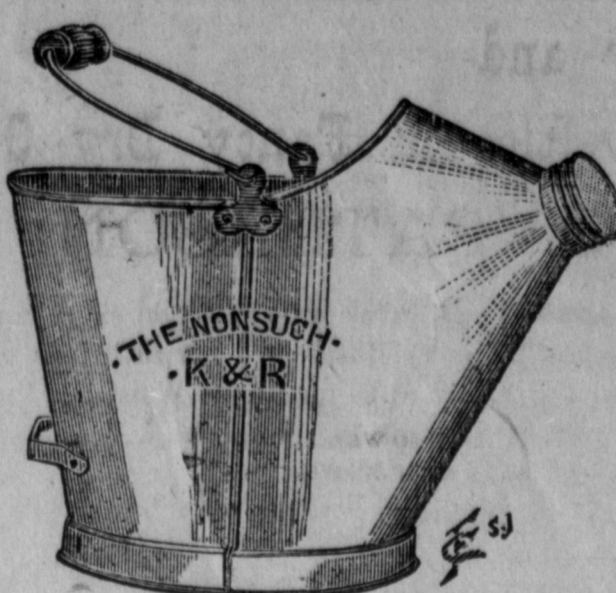
