

LOCAL NEWS

BIRTHS, MARRIAGES and DEATHS.—The returns of Mr. Robert Hutchinson, Registrar of births, marriages and deaths for the County of Kent, shows that 293 births, 74 marriages, and 105 deaths took place in the County within the last six months.

DESTROYED BY FIRE.—John Boomer's residence on the Hartley road, four miles distant from Harcourt station, was destroyed by fire on Wednesday evening of last week. Nothing was saved. There is no insurance. Boomer was away in the lumber woods on the Millstream in Rescouche.

MILLING A MILL.—Mr. James Brown, of Harcourt, has removed the machinery from his mill on the Sawdust Wharf, Richibucto, to Bass River where he will set it up and saw birch and beech planks during the winter. It is said he intends putting heavier machinery in the mill here next season.

ILLEGAL LOBSTER FISHING.—Fifteen convictions were made before Inspector Chapman at Moncton last week of parties engaged in fishing lobsters on the North Shore in violation of the fisheries Act. Overseer Munro prosecuted. The officers intend to enforce the law to the utmost rigor.—Times.

THE ST. JOHN WORKMAN.—The first number of this paper under the management of the new proprietors, Messrs. McLean & Mitchell, has been received. It is an eight-page paper—five columns to a page—and a large quantity of interesting reading matter, much of it in reference to labor matters.

SMELTS.—The smelt trade continued brisk all last week, and several large shipments were made. The catch in the main channel was large last Monday, and prices went as high as 3¢ cents per lb. As long as the smelts continue as plentiful and the prices as good as at present the fishermen will continue to rake in the shekels.

IN THE WOODS.—The snow storms of Friday night and Monday were welcomed by the lumbermen. The yarding had all been done, and as there was no snow for hauling, some of the men were talking of coming out of the woods till snow arrived. Operations can now be carried on successfully, and there will, no doubt, be a big cut this winter.

THE METHODIST CHURCH AT HAR- COURT.—We publish in another column in this issue an account of the opening services in the new Wesley Memorial Church at Harcourt Station, together with a cut of the new building. It is said to be one of the finest church buildings in the county, and speaks loudly in praise of the enterprise of the Methodists of Harcourt.

Hatfield for St. Martin's Academy, and Miss Maud Grierson to resume her duties as teacher at Dorchester. Mrs. Hatfield accompanied her son.

A KENT COUNTY MAN BURNED OUT.—A fire at Lynn, Mass., early Saturday morning, totally destroyed the shoe factory of Placide Hebert, and the building adjoining occupied by Mrs. Joseph Hebert as a restaurant. The loss of Placide Hebert is placed at \$30,000.

Mr. Hebert left this County some years ago and worked in the shoe factory of James T. Hurley, St. John. He afterwards removed to Lynn, and started in business. He is the brother of Rev. Fr. Hebert, of St. Paul.

THE B. & M. RAILWAY.—Mr. Hall, local manager of the B. & M. Railway, went over the road on Friday making measurements and taking preliminary steps towards a thorough repair of the road. The Times says:—E. G. Evans, who was recently appointed receiver of the Buctouche and Moncton railway, will proceed at once to put the road in thorough repair. The bridges will be repaired and the road itself put in good running order. This line has been neglected for a long time and has run down very much, but when these repairs are completed the bond holders will get all the return possible out of the property.

DIED AT CAMPOBELLO.—A Campobello correspondent of the 31 ult. writes to the St. John Sun as follows: James Foster, a resident of this place for the past twelve years, who died of pneumonia, was buried here today under the directions of the parish officers (J. A. Calder and Wellington Parker overseers of the poor). While residing here he lived in a camp as a hermit. He claimed his birth place to be Galloway, Kent Co., N. B. The best of care was taken of him by the above mentioned officers of this parish and his nurse, Daniel Harvey. The L. O. G. 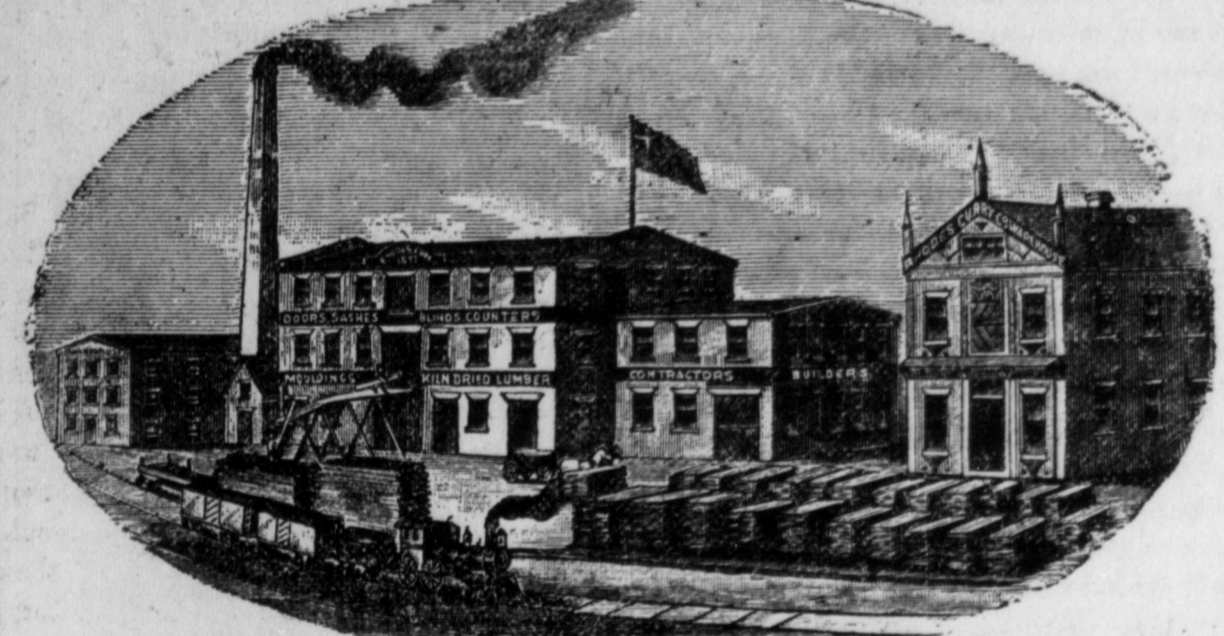
