

Governor Russell, of Massachusetts, in his inagural speech to-day, referred to Canada, saying: "The establishment of closer trade relations between us and Canada is a matter of much importance to this commonwealth. On few subjects is there stronger interest or greater unanimity of sentiment among citizens. To our manufacturers and merchants it will give the opportunity for large extension of trade by opening to them an important profitable market, and an abundant supply of raw material. A broad measure of reciprocity with Canada would make Massachusetts, especially Boston, an industrial and commercial centre of greatly enlarged territory. I believe it would be both wise and proper to express this to Congress by resolution."

Restigouche Notes. Rev. Wm. Murchie of the North West, has been obliged on account of sickness to return to Louison Brook, his native place. The change has already had a beneficial effect on his health and it is that city last week destroyed a million and hoped he soon will be able to return to his field of labor.

Wm. D. Miller, of Sunnyside, left last fall for Minneapolis, where he soon secured employment. He had been there only a short time when the buildings of his employers caught fire, and, in endeavouring to help extinguish the flames, he so exposed himself to the cold that a severe attack of puenmonia was brought on. Death was the result. He has left a widow and several children to mourn their loss.

Miss Maggie Cook, of Black Point, entered the Normal School at the beginning of last term, but was soon compelled to return home on account of ill health. Her death took place on the last day of the year, at the early age of eighteen. Her premature death is deeply regretted by her many friends, as she was greatly beloved for her many good qualities.
