The Newly-Discovered Gospel of St. Peter.

Since the Greek Bishop Bryennios found the Teaching of the Twelve Apostles, few, if any, discoveries in the department of Biblical literature are equal in worth to that of the fragments of a Gospel attributed to the Apostle St. Peter, unearthed some time ago in the City of the Dead Akhmim, the Old Panopolis. The manuscript is written on parchment, and has been published by U. Bouriant, the Director of the French Archaeological Institute in Cairo. This document, which is now in the Museum at Gizeh, is of thirty-three pages, in Old leather binding. It is not dated, but the orthography and writing show that it is not older than the eighth, and not younger than the twelfth, century. It was found in an old Christian cemetery. On the first page is a sign, doubtless representing the Coptic cross; to the right and left are the letters Alpha and Omega. On the back, the text itself begins at what turns out to be parts of an old Gospel attributed to St. Peter.

The fragment of the Gospel happens to begin with the words, "But of the Jews no one washed his hands, neither Herod, nor any of the Judges, nor of the Senate washed their hands. Pilate arose, and Herod the King commanded that the Lord should be brought." The fragment covers nine pages of the manuscript and breaks off in the middle of a sentence; and after stating that the women had come to the grave and found it empty, concludes with these words: "But I, Simon Peter, and Andrew, my brother taking with us our nets, returned to the sea, and there was with us Levi, the son of Alphaeus, whom the Lord . . ." This sentence is of the greatest value, showing that the author claims to be Peter himself.

The leading variants between the statements of this pseudo-Gospel fragment and the canonical Gospel are briefly the following: At the request of Joseph, here declared to be a friend of Pilate and of the Lord, the former asks Herod for the body of the Christ. The request is granted with the statement that if no one had asked for the body, then Herod and the Jews would have buried the Lord, because the Sabbath was approaching, and it was a mandate of the Law that the body of one who had been killed should not remain unburied at the setting of the Sun before the Feast of Unleavened Bread; then follows a description of the sufferings of Christ, but in a more vivid manner than that found in the Gospels. Then we are told: "And they led two malefactors and crucified the Lord between them. He Himself, however, said nothing and had no suffering." According to these words the real Lord was not nailed to the Cross. When the one malefactor petitioned Christ for His help, he is threatened by the multitude with still greater tortures. When at the hour of noon it becomes so dark that many lamps were lighted, the Jews began to be afraid. The Lord however, cries out: "My Strength, my Strength, thou hast deserted me; and when He had said this He was taken away." The nails are drawn out of the hands of the Lord, and He is laid upon the ground, which violently trembles. The Elders and Priests are filled with sorrow, and they cry out: "Woe over our sins; near unto us have come the judgements and the end of Jerusalem. I, Peter, however, lamented together with my friends and were cast down in our minds, and we hid ourselves, and were hunted as malefactors, and as those who would set fire to the Temple. But over all this we fasted and sat sad and fasted and lamented day and night unto the Sabbath." The petition of the Elders addressed to Pilate to have the grave guarded is based on the excited feeling of the populace, who, in view of the signs and wonders that took place in connection with the Crucifixion, are beginning to incline toward the Messiah. The name of the Centurion to whom the watch was entrusted is Petronius. All those present assist in rolling the stone before the tomb, which is sealed with seven seals. Beside the grave a tent is erected for the watchers. On the day before Easter the people flock to the grave to see and inspect the seven seals. In the following night, however, while the soldiers are watching, a mighty voice sounds from Heaven, which is opened, and two men descend from it in a great light. The stone rolls away of itself, and the men enter the opened grave. The Centurion and the Elders, who are present, are awakened. While the watchers are still engaged in telling the story they see three men come out of the grave. The two are supporting the third, and a cross follows them; the heads of the two reach to the heavens, but the hand in [here follows words that cannot be made out] it transcends the heavens, and they hear a voice [words that are dark, but are translated by Bouriant Tu as proclamé aux gens unis et somis]. A voice is also heard from the Cross. While those present deliberate whether they should send word to Pilate, the heavens again open, and a man descends and enters the grave. Thereupon the watchers flee in dismay, and, in the presence of Pilate, confess their faith in Christ as the Son of God. The leaders of the Jews, indeed, see their great wrong, but because of this fear of the wrath of the Resurrection he kept a secret. The youth sitting at the grave says: "Whom have ye come to seek save the One who was

crucified? He has arisen, and his gone away. But if this is not believed bend down and see the place where He has been laid, for He is no longer here. For He is risen, and departed whence He was sent." Here the fragments end.—Literary Digest.

A Strong Man of Old.

We hear a good deal about the "strong men" of to-day, but it may be doubted whether they could perform some of the feats achieved by the strong men of the olden times. Besides Sanson there was Milo of Crotona, a town in the south of Italy that was founded by the Greeks, who had flourished five hundred years B. C. He is said to have run the whole length of the chariot race-course with a four-year-old bull on his shoulders, and then to have felled the animal with one blow of his fist and eaten it the same day. He was once attending the lectures of the famous philosopher Pythagoras, when the pillar that supported the roof gave way. Milo held up the pillar while the people made their escape. He ate twenty pounds of meat, twenty pounds of bread and drank eighteen pints of wine daily. He could stand so firmly on a quail, oiled to make it slippery, that no one could push him off. However his strength led to his death. Making no allowance for his growing years, he tried to split an oak tree in half that had been partly rent by wedges. Milo forced the wedges out, but the tree sprang together on his hands so tightly that he could not release them. Being thus imprisoned and unable to obtain help, he was devoured by wolves.

Baptist Year Book.

The Baptist year book of the Maritime Provinces for 1893 has just been issued. It contains the constitution, list of ministers, and a report of the proceedings of the convention, with all the official reports, financial, missionary, educational and statistical, and generally presents a view of the progress and position of the denomination, which is of great interest. Among other notable things is a statement that in answer to a circular respecting the use of wine at the sacrament 125 churches replied, of which 115 use the unfermented; 2 use fermented, and 7 neither; 124 churches also declared in favor of prohibition of strong drink. In all, there are over 43,000 Baptists and 394 churches in these provinces. The large sums raised for all the purposes of the church, including home and foreign missionary work, education, preaching, show a hearty spirit in the denomination.

How to Roast Meat.

The glory of a piece of roasted meat lies in the preservation of its juices. This may be best done by placing the meat in a hot oven, at first, until it is lightly browned. This "sets" the juices and causes a coating to form on the outside to keep all juice from escaping. After the first fifteen minutes the oven may be allowed to cool somewhat, so that the meat has a chance to become thoroughly cooked without being burned on the outside.

In boiling meat the piece should be plunged into a pot of briskly boiling water. It should then boil more slowly until cooked through. In this way the natural flavor and nourishing juices are preserved.

Eloped with Her Boarder.

New York, Dec. 29.—"I can't account for it. I only know that I love John and I don't love my husband," explained Lizzie Childs, when she was arraigned in the Tombs Police Court yesterday, charged with eloping with John Fitzpatrick and abandoning her seven-year-old child and her husband.

Lizzie is thirty-seven and Fitzpatrick is twenty-eight and has been boarding with the Childs family in Morristown, N. J.

They eloped on Thursday night and Fitzpatrick decided to replenish his wardrobe from the husband's stock.

The husband informed the police and the couple were arrested at No. 59 Bedford street, this city, Friday afternoon.

In court yesterday the husband was willing to take his wife back, but she refused.

The charge that Fitzpatrick had stolen some of Child's clothes did not hold, as the wife said she gave them to her love, and Justice Grady said that a wife could not steal from her husband.

The prisoners were discharged.

Childs is a well-to-do florist in Morristown and a church deacon. He followed his wife out of court and tried to speak with her, but she repelled his advances and went off with Fitzpatrick.

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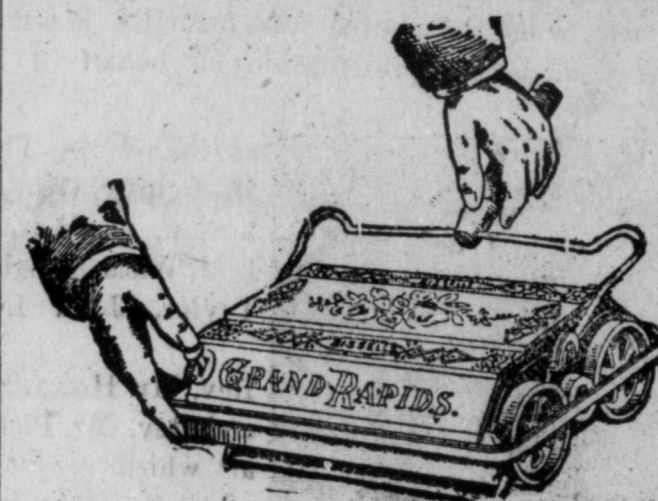
