KENT CENSUS RETURNS.—According to the figures of the last census returns there are in the County of Kent, 17,136 Roman Catholics; 1,365 Episcopalians; 3,736 Presbyterians; 930 Methodists; 626 Baptists; 1,000 Lutherans; 5 Congregationalists; 2 Universalists; 3 Protestants and 44 persons who do not profess to have any religion.

ANOTHER NEW BOAT.—Mr. Joseph Michaud has just completed a new boat which he claims will be one of the fastest in the harbor. She is 18 feet keel, 8 feet beam, and will draw about three feet of water. He expects to launch her next week. Joe does not intend to let the Kingston boats carry off the laurels this season if he can help it.

DEATH OF CAPTAIN JAMIESON.—Word was received from Hopewell Cape announcing the death of Capt. Barlow P. Jamieson, of the brig "Enterprise," which occurred either at Santos or on voyage from Great Britain to that port. The deceased was 40 years old. Captain Jamieson was formerly a frequent visitor to this port. He then had charge of the bark "Ethaudine." He leaves a wife and two children at Hopewell Cape.

THE FISK JUBILEE SINGERS.—Congressman Joseph D. Sayers, of Texas went to hear the Fisk Jubilee Singers the other night. At the Capitol he was full of the experience.

"There is nothing on earth like it," he said. "The white people can't sing. There is a peculiar quality in the negro voice which the Caucasian vainly attempts to imitate. It is not huskiness, but a kind of deep richness of tone, that is music. The songs that the negroes sang from the stage carried me back many a year to the dead, but not forgotten time, when 'master' reigned supreme on the old plantation and the naked pickaninnies rolled upon the sand. Shutting my eyes I could leap the gulf of time and see the dusky toilers returning from the fields when the sun had dipped below the horizon, while their fifty voices rolled over the tops of the cotton in a burst of melody that once heard is never to be forgotten. I never miss negro singing if I can help it. It freshens a man up and for a while makes him a boy again.—Washington Post.

DEATH AT KOUCHIBOUQUAC.—The last tribute of respect was on Friday last paid to one of the most highly esteemed residents of Carleton, the wife of John Tweedie Sr. She had for some years been a sufferer from rheumatism and in the early part of this winter had a serious attack and was quite ill for some time, but she rallied again and has since been as well as usual. A few weeks ago she was again taken suddenly ill but no worse than formerly, until Monday of last week when she became rapidly worse. A physician was called in but he announced that he could do nothing for her and on Wednesday morning, at half past seven, she passed quietly away to her well-earned rest, inflammation finishing the work rheumatism had begun. She was a kind and loving wife and mother, and a good neighbor, and her death has caused much sorrow among her many friends and neighbors. She leaves a husband, three sons, and four daughters, to mourn their sad loss. She was 72 years of age. 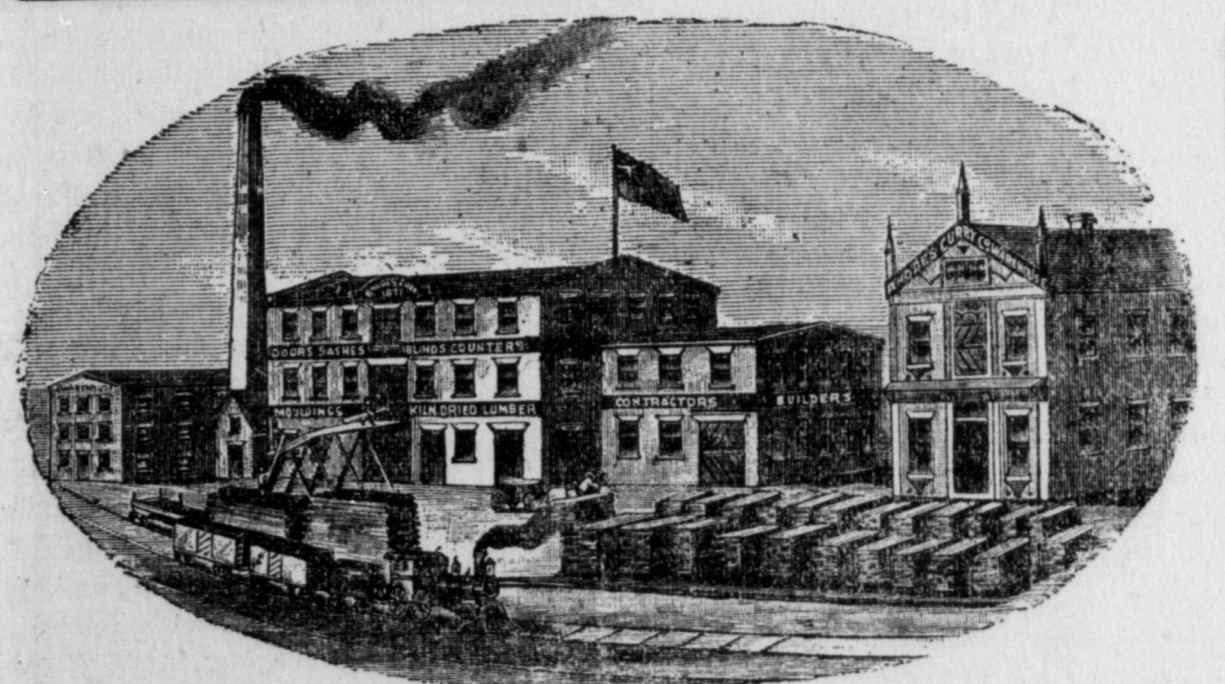
