Legislation of N. B. (Continued from Page 1.)

Mr. Killam resumed the chair and the discussion was continued and lasted fully an hour longer. Mr. Powell objected to the amendment that it introduced party politics: Mr. Hill agreed with the facts of the amendment, but did not like the wording of it: Mr. Howe demanded nothing less than non-sectarian schools; Mr. Gogain could not support the amendment, and then Mr. Mott eulogized the course of the Attorney General on the matter and defended his colleague Mr. Labilloy from the attacks and insinuations directed against him and said he had a good reputation in his county, which is a Protestant one, and which returns him, a Catholic, by handsome majorities; Dr. Alward supported the amendment and then Mr. Phinney closed the debate in another vigorous speech. Referring to Mr. Mott he said he had a better opinion of him than Mr. Labilloy and that he knew much about the latter. Later referring to Mr. Gogain he declared he was a man who could not be bought and said that other hon. members could take that to themselves. Mr. Mott thanked him for his good words, and said in a previous debate he had been misrepresented in some remarks referring to Rev. A. F. Thomson. He did not say he was unreliable.

The vote was taken on the amendment at 4 o'clock, the House dividing as follows: Yeas—Stockton, Phinney, Shaw, Smith (St. John), Alward, Howe, Pinder, Pitts, Allen, Powell—10.

Nays—Blair, Mitchell, Emmerson, White, Tweedie, Labilloy, Connell, Gogain, Lewis, Russell, Theriault, Blanchard, Sivebright, Mott, Smith (Westmorland), Flewelling, Scovil, O'Brien (Northumberland), Baird, Dibblee, Dunn, McLeod, Wells, Ferris, O'Brien (Charlotte), Hill—26.

Mr. Powell then moved an amendment to the original motion:

Resolved, That all the words after the word "resolved" in the first line be struck out and that in lieu thereof there be inserted the following words: "That this House recommends that one of the Judges of the Supreme Court be commissioned under Act of Assembly 49 Victoria, chapter 4, to proceed as soon as convenient to Bathurst town and village to inquire into and fully and thoroughly investigate an alleged infraction of the law or regulations on the part of the teachers or trustees in each of said districts, and generally to inquire into all matters of complaint which shall be laid before the said commissioner touching the management of the schools in said districts and the administration of the school law and regulations of the Board of Education in the said districts, and take evidence upon all such matters on oath and report the evidence so taken to the Board of Education, and that the Board immediately thereupon cause the evidence to be published."

Mr. Powell supported the amendment in a strong speech.

Mr. Blair replied and said he had no objection to the evidence being published, but he objected to taking away the right to appoint a County Court Judge.

At 4.15 the vote was taken on the amendment and resulted as follows: Yeas—Powell, Stockton, Phinney, Shaw, Smith (St. John), Alward Lewis, Howe, Pinder, Pitts, Allen, Perley—12.

Nays—Blair, Mitchell, Emmerson, White, Tweedie, Labilloy, Connell, Gogain, Russell, Theriault, Blanchard, Sivebright, Mott, Smith (Westmorland), Flewelling, Scovil, O'Brien (Northumberland), Baird, Dibblee, Dunn, McLeod, Wells, Ferris, O'Brien (Charlotte), Hill—25.

The original motion was carried on the same vote reversed.

Then the Speaker was called in, the motion reported and agreed to, and the House adjourned at 4.30 a. m.

Mr. McINERNEY'S SPEECH.

On the Motion to Censure Clarke Wallace.

I deprecate entirely the discussion of such questions as this in this House, because I know they are calculated to lead to bitter feelings and sometimes to expressions of sentiments, in the heat of debate, that the speakers afterwards regret. I cannot, however, give a silent vote on this question. The county from which I come, represents, in a small degree, the different discordant elements which go to make up this country. We have a large French-Canadian population, who are in the majority. We have then a large English Protestant population and a very small Irish Catholic community. In that country I have endeavored, as far as I could, to keep down all religious bickerings, so that peace might prevail; and, as the best proof that we are free from these bickerings, I may say that, in the different elections I have run, at least nine-tenths of the Protestant vote have been cast for me, against all competitors. The stand I take here, both by words and vote, is one which I wish understood properly by the intelligent men of the different nationalities and religions in the county of Kent. I cannot fail to admit that the words of the hon. Controller of Customs are not calculated to promote peace and goodwill in this country. They are, on the contrary, opposed to peace and good order in Canada, and should not be supported or upheld by any person in this Parliament or country who wants to see Canada contented, happy and prosperous. The senior member for Halifax (Mr. Kenny) endeavored to raise a question which I do not think is germane to the subject. He submitted the proposition, that this was a vote of want of confidence in the Government, and that, as he was sent here to support the Government, he could not vote for the amendment. Then, we have the leader of the House, in whom I have every confidence, declaring, immediately afterwards, that the Government were not responsible for the utterances of the Controller of Customs. If the Government do not hold themselves responsible for these utterances, how can a vote of censure upon them include a vote of want of confidence in the Government? I cannot understand the logic of that conclusion, and, therefore, in voting for this amendment, I claim that I am not voting want of confidence in the Government. I wish to censure the remarks made by the Controller of Customs, because I think they were uncalled for, unnecessary and harmful. I would like to ask that hon. gentleman a simple question. The leader of the House stated, that he did not see in the utterances reported in the newspapers, any declaration of the Controller of Customs, that he would carry armed resistance to the Home Rule Bill into Ulster. Now, I wish to ask the Controller of Customs, if he meant, by the words "active aid," armed resistance or anything of that nature? What did he mean by those words? I would be glad if he would do me the honor of giving me an answer, because, throughout this country the impression is growing, and the impression will grow still further, that active aid, as expressed by the Controller of Customs, meant armed resistance, and that is the interpretation which has been put upon those words. I think that every member of this House ought to be free to vote according to his own conscience and views in this matter. That is what I intend to do, and I wish to be in the position of being able to go back to the independent, honest, sturdy, intelligent and stalwart Protestants of the county of Kent, and tell them it is for these reasons I vote for this amendment.

Messrs. Percy Wilbur, Henry Bishop, A. J. H. Stewart and W. J. O'Brien went to St. John and Fredericton this week.

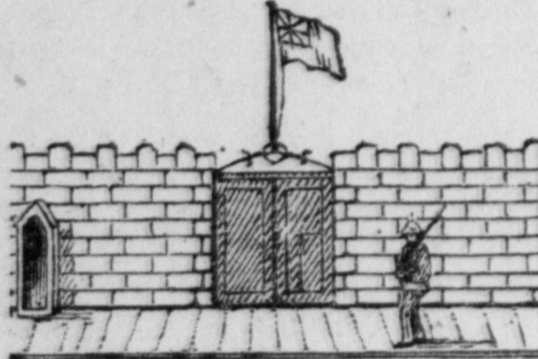
