METHODIST CONFERENCE.—The Con-ference of the Methodist church of New Brunswick will be held at Moncton, June 19th. The I. C. MUST PAY UP .- The department of Indian affairs has notified the squatters on the Big Cove Indian Reserve, that they will be given until November 1st and no longer, to pay for the lands occupied by them. The amount named is \$2.00 per acre, one-third in cash, and the balance in two equal annual instalments with interest at the late of .ix per cent from that date.
