MUST PAY UP.—The department of Indian affairs has notified the squatters on the Big Cove Indian Reserve, that they will be given until November 1st and no longer, to pay for the lands occupied by them.

A number of our young men will leave in a few days for Uncle Sam's land.

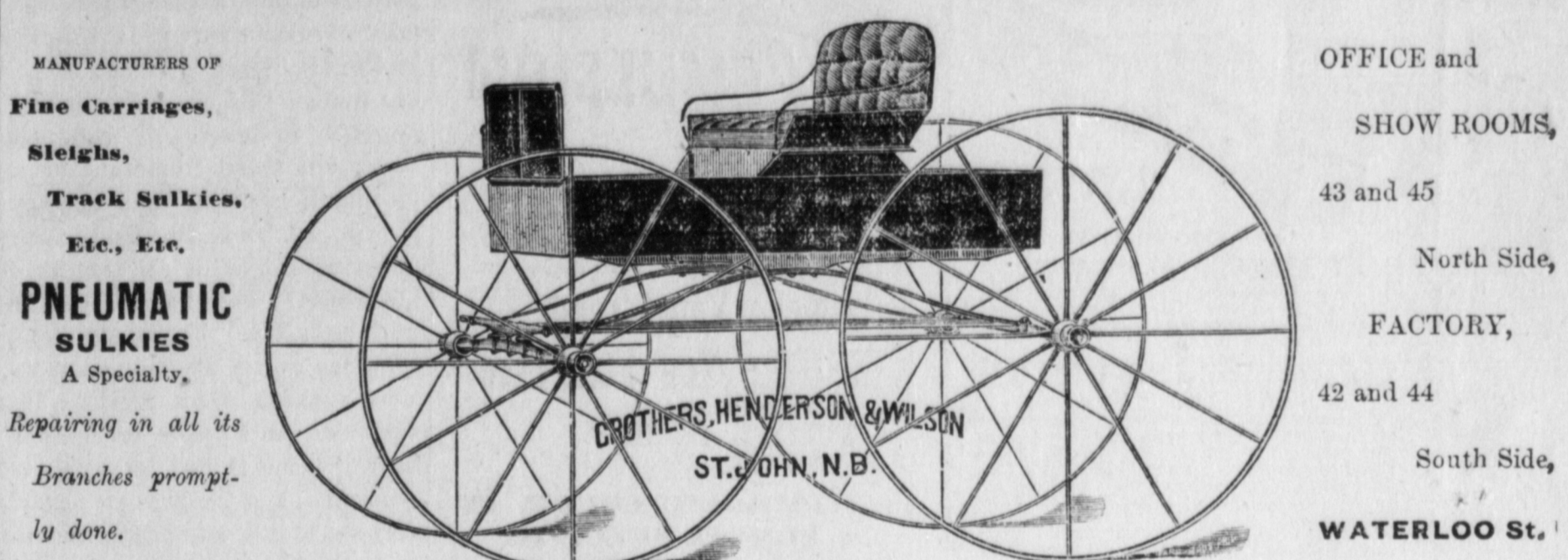
We are pleased to hear that Mr. Richard O'Leary has had great luck fishing lobsters at Point Sapin.
