HYGIENIC COFFEE.—Two quarts of wheat bran, one cupful of molasses, white of one egg; to be well mixed and browned in the oven until of a dark brown color, stirring often to prevent scorching.—Housekeeper.

Lunch and Luncheon.

The words lunch and luncheon have been very much discussed, and great difference of opinion expressed regarding their significance. Some authorities consider them synonymous, others that their real meaning is far from the same. Mrs. Dahlgren, in her book upon Social Life in Washington, frankly said that she desired to present unsettled points and disputed questions that by interchange of opinion some settled basis might be established.
