

LOCAL NEWS.

PRESBYTERY MEETING.—At a meeting of the Miramichi Presbytery, held in Harcourt last Thursday evening, the Rev. J. H. Cameron, B. A., tendered his resignation as minister of Bass and Nicholas Rivers. He has accepted an appointment to the North West, and is expected to leave his present field of labor, at the end of this month.

LUMBER SEIZED.—Mr. John Stevenson, seizing officer, seized a quantity of cedar and hackmatack sleepers near the I. C. R., between Acadiaville and Kent Junction last week. He claims they were cut on ungranted land, and the seizure was made in default of payment of stampage dues. They are advertised for sale on Friday, the 23rd instant.

A DUCKING.—Two of the sailors belonging to the Norwegian vessel Idun lying in Kingston, amused themselves Sunday afternoon by sailing up and down the river near Kingston. A heavy puff of wind struck the boat, and she filled and sunk. The sailors managed to swim to the shore. The boat was found Monday, and brought to the surface.

BUILDINGS BURNED.—The dwelling house and barn on the Wark farm, above Kingston, were burned to the ground Sunday afternoon. The fire is supposed to have caught from a spark falling on the roof of the house. A high wind prevailed and in a very short time the buildings were reduced to ashes. Part of the furniture in the house was saved. About sixty tons of hay and five hundred bushels of oats stored in the barn awaiting shipment to Newfoundland were consumed. The buildings were insured in the Liverpool and London and Globe Insurance Co., the produce in the Western and the Manchester Fire. Mr. O. Smith, who holds the property in trust for the two children of his deceased brother, has begun making preparations to rebuild.

BARK UNITY.—The St. John Globe states that word has been received from Bahia Blanca, announcing the arrival of the Unity at that port, from Portland, Maine, with a cargo of lumber. Between Cape Corrintes and Bahia Blanca she met with severe gales and was twenty days in making the passage. She lost all her sails, damaged hull and cargo, and before entering port she grounded on a bank. Captain McLaughlin thinking his vessel was a complete loss, and through the excitement of his position, was attacked with paralysis on one side of his body; the mate then took command, and with the help of some fishermen the vessel was floated at high tide and taken into port. Mr. J. D. Phinney, managing owner, received word that the captain had suffered a slight paralytic stroke, but nothing was said about the vessel being damaged. She has sailed with a cargo of grain for Great Britain.

EQUITY COURT.—Messrs. J. H. Abbott, and J. D. Phinney, went to St. John, last week to attend a sitting of the Equity Court before Judge Tuck, in the case of the Joggins Railway Co., vs. The Merchants Bank of Halifax. The facts of the case are as follows:—The plaintiffs engaged John C. Brown to construct 12 miles of railway for them, and in order to enable him to procure the necessary funds assigned to him their interest in the Provincial and Dominion subsidies given in connection with the road. Brown again assigned them to the bank as security for an advance of \$20,000, for which a note endorsed by plaintiffs was also given, the arrangement being one to which the three parties were privy. The bank collected the subsidies, which more than paid the \$20,000 and a small amount of further indebtedness which plaintiffs also incurred on their own account. The bank then transferred the balance in their hands at Moncton to its Kingston branch, and there placed it to the credit of John C. Brown, whose indebtedness to them at the Kingston branch was more than this balance. The plaintiffs claim that the bank could use the proceeds of the subsidies only in liquidation of the \$20,000 of Brown's indebtedness; in other words that it was an hypothecation on a special account only, while the bank's defence is that it was Brown's general account. The hearing of the case began Thursday, Saturday morning the case was adjourned and a commission issued to take the evidence of Brown, in Boston. Messrs. Teed, and Pugsley, for plaintiffs, Powell, and Attorney General Blair for the bank, J. D. Phinney, for Brown, and W. W. Wells, for Josiah Wood.


