FREDERICTON, March 14.—Mitchell submitted a statement of the current revenue account up to March 8th.

Mitchell also submitted the estimates. They are as follows.

Estimates for sums required for the service of the province: not otherwise provided for the current year:

Mitchell made the budget speech and was followed by Powell in opposition.

White replied in defence of the government's policy and was followed by Alward in opposition.

The motion that Mr. Speaker do now leave the chair was then carried and the House went into committee of supply.

Killam in the chair.

There was an evening session, when Alward moved an amendment to the item of \$1,100 for three engrossing clerks. This was opposed by Allen and Shaw. After explanations by Government speakers that the only additional expenditure involved was \$200 which was to be divided between two of the engrossing law clerks for attendance upon the general committees, the item was carried, as were several other items, including that of public printing and \$1000 for law clerk.

Further consideration of supply was made the order of the day for to-morrow.

Adjourned.

FREDERICTON, March 15.—On recommendation of the nominating committee, Mr. Wells, at his request, was relieved from duty as a member of the public accounts committee and Mr. Killam was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson introduced a bill in addition to and in amendment of the N. B. dental act of 1890.

The house then resumed committee of supply Killam in the chair.

When the house adjourned at nine o'clock all the items of supply had passed.

On motion of Mitchell it was decided that the supply be made the order of the day for Tuesday next.

FREDERICTON, March 16.—Mr. Stockton moved seconded by Pinder the motion of which notice had been given for particulars of all sums borrowed from Banks, rates of interest paid, etc.

Mr. Hill from standing rules committee submitted report.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson introduced a bill incorporating the Memramcook Gold mining company.

Mr. Ferris introduced a bill incorporating the New Brunswick coal company.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell introduced bills encouraging development of Nickel mines.

FREDERICTON, March 17.—Answering Mr. Pitts, Hon. Mr. Mitchell said that there were no outstanding accounts in connection with expenditure in the Maritime Bank case and that the \$4000 included all the expenses of the case.

Mr. Alward made his motion, seconded by Mr. Smith, for particulars re Woodstock bridge.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson promised the formation.

Mr. Allen made his motion, seconded by Mr. Pitts, for the particulars of the payment of \$800 to J. McD. Barker for extras.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell promised the information.

Mr. Pitts made his motion, seconded by Mr. Allen, for particulars of the expendi-

ture of \$4000 on account of the Maritime Bank case showing how much went for travelling expenses and to whom paid and how much went for counsel fees and to whom paid.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell promised the information.

The Carleton county election case was then resumed.

Hon. Mr. Blair moved the following amendment: Resolved that in the opinion of this house it is not advisable to proceed with a petition complaining of the undue election and return of a member of this house in any case which could be or could have been prosecuted before the supreme court under the controverted elections act until the sum of one thousand dollars is deposited by the petitioner with the Receiver General subject to the order of the house to defray expenses incurred in connection with such petition.

The debate occupied nearly the whole of the afternoon and evening.

The amendment was carried by the following vote:

Hon. Mr. Mitchell committed a bill to provide for the redemption of debentures falling due in 1894, 1895, and 1896, Mr. Killam in the chair. Progress was reported with leave to sit.

Mr. Powell introduced a bill changing the names of Alexander P. Pick and Charlotte R. Pick of Moncton to Mitchell.

Mr. Ferris introduced a bill incorporating the N. B. Coal Company.

Mr. Pitts presented a petition of 8 rate payers of Carleton county in respect to public schools. After an informal discussion as to whether the endorsement of the petition was sufficiently definite the petition was received.

House adjourned.

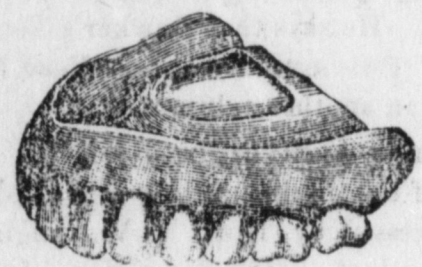

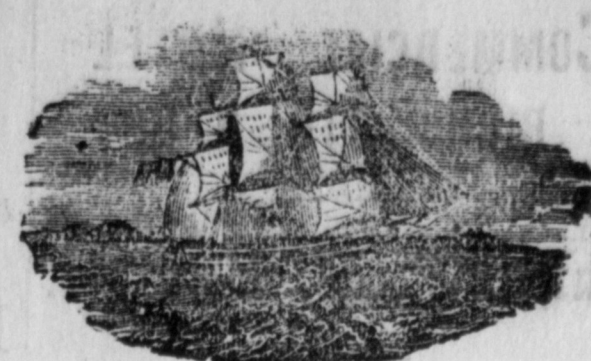
