B., Rolling Mills intends to control the four large Montreal manufacturing companies, Peck & Berry, Pillow & Hersey, Montreal Rolling Mills, and Abbot & Sons. The syndicate has also options on the New Glasgow and other Nova Scotia steel plants.

The Local government have appointed Hon. Wm. Pugsley and Mr. Geo. A. Hughes secretaries to the general committee. The latter are also to take a part in the engrossing of bills, the other engrossing clerk being Mr. L. C. Macnutt.

GENERAL NEWS.

The Montreal Freemasons contemplate building a temple to cost fifty thousand dollars or more.

The whole number of males in the United States is 32,067,800, and the whole number of females 30,554,380.

The General synod of the Protestant church of Ireland unanimously adopted a resolution condemning the Irish Home Rule bill.

Mr. Gladstone was received with cheers on Friday when he appeared in the House of Commons after his recent illness.

Austrian, Swiss and German Catholics have petitioned the Pope that he call an international conference to take steps to abolish gambling at Monte Carlo.

At 7 a. m. Sunday morning fire broke out in Tremont Temple, Boston; before noon the entire structure was gutted. The loss in the temple is valued at \$200,000.

Intelligence has been received showing beyond doubt that White Star Line from freight steamer Naronic which sailed from Liverpool February 11th for New York is lost.

The Duke of York is to join the Masonic body, of which his father is the grand master. All the sons of the Queen are Freemasons, with the exception of the Duke of Edinburgh.

It seems to be not unlikely that prorogation of parliament will take place at an early date. The members are anxious to get away before Easter and business is going through with a rush.

Last week a blizzard and snow storm raged in the western and northwestern states as far out as the Rockies. In Kansas and Nebraska the storm was particularly severe. Trains were delayed, and traffic generally demoralized.

The death of Jules Ferry, the eminent French statesman, caused by heart disease was due to an affection of the heart from which he suffered due to the effect of a bullet striking a rib near the base of the heart at the time he was attacked by Anbertin in 1887.

Lady Mowat, whose death is announced, was 68 years of age, and had been married forty-eight years. She was a daughter of the late John Ewart, of Toronto. She had five children, two sons and three daughters. For some years she has been a great sufferer from asthma.

Latest advices from the scene of the trouble between the Kitkatka Indians and Bella Coola state that a war canoe full of the latter is chasing a party of Kitkatkas who murdered several Bella Coolas on Sorrow Island about a fortnight ago. No word has been received from Flint, the Indian agent sent to investigate the trouble and his safety is feared of. The Bella Coolas are the most warlike of all the British Columbia tribes and it is feared they will make considerable trouble.

Advices from St. Petersburg tell of the death of a large number of convicts bound for the prison of Siberia. After six hours march from Tomsk a heavy snow storm set in rendering the roads impassable. The cold was intense and one by one the prisoners fell exhausted in the snow where they were left to freeze to death; and of the 374 persons who had started on the march, but 91 survived. Among those lost were seven women and four children.

A despatch from Bucharest says:—The River Dimbovetza overflowing its banks on Wednesday, and since Friday morning has been bringing down from the mountains immense quantities of ice. An ice dam above this city broke Friday at noon. Great masses of ice were swept against the bridge at the north-western end of the city, and the middle of the structure was carried away. The disaster came with such suddenness that persons and convicts on the bridge could not be saved. Thirty men and women were carried away in the ruins and were drowned. Several vehicles also went down in the flood. Friday the river has fallen slightly.
