Being largely isolated from the rest of mankind by a stormy sea, and cast much on their own resources, we find, as we might expect, the people, while somewhat narrow and exclusive in their views, possessed of a whole souled hospitality and kindness almost unique among mankind. Once known as a respectable person, no kindness is considered too expensive for the visitor to the inland. At the same time the punctilio of etiquette is more rigidly enforced than among Canadians or Americans, and bears none of the hail good fellow well met kind of salutation so common in Canada. Men and women bow with a courtly grace, reminding one of Quebec; and indeed this city is a good deal like Quebec, and one notes the same kind of conveyances, the same style of horse and harness and cart, the same obliging manner in the coachman, clerks and all public employes, and in the buildings and street furnishings a good deal of resemblance will be noticed. The sea has done for Newfoundland what language and creed has done for Quebec, i. e., preserved her civilization. You know at once that you are among a sea-faring people. The leisurely roll of the athletic fellows you meet on the streets, the signs on the stores, the large fleet of ships in the harbor and the conversation you overhear at the corners, all tell you of the sea. The papers are all filled with reports of shipping and other nautical news. The reports of the banks and of out harbors are all noted carefully, and one sees how much the sea has to do with Newfoundland at once.

When even jurymen on their oath were bullied and cowed in the jury box and dare not give a verdict against this king of Kent? If so, they can now appreciate the condition of the laboring people and fishermen of this colony. The rebuilding of the city is proceeding rapidly and the foundation of a large number of buildings is now laid. The style and character of these structures are however, far inferior to their predecessors destroyed by the fire. And the appearance of the new city will not equal the old. The people are now recovering their wanted spirits, and balls, parties and excursions are of every day occurrence. The conference of the Methodist church of Newfoundland is sitting now and has been so engaged for a fortnight back. The good men take their time, and it may be are not anxious to leave the city for the lonely places many of them live in during the rest of the year. The papers here do not contain much news of the outside world, and no such a live periodical as THE REVIEW is found on the island. The people as a rule do not know much of Canada and have been prejudiced against her by renegade Canadians. How does it come to pass that our country while having so much to love and being loved by all true men and honored the world over, has been so unfortunate as to produce a set of vipers that like the serpent in the fable stings the breast that warms and feeds them. Not only at home do they decry and abuse their country, but when abroad they scandalize the home that gave them birth, and in the eyes of all men by their own words proclaim the selves liars and cowards. It is quite a different thing to oppose a party than to decry one's own country.

The Pall Mall Gazette says the Behring Sea arbitrators have decided in favor of Great Britain in every point at issue in the dispute, jurisdiction, proprietorship, etc. The decision does not recognize the United States' claim of jurisdiction in Behring Sea, based on Russian rights. It also decided that the United States' alleged right to property in seals does not exist in law or fact. The judgement of the arbitrators was unanimous on all points save one, when the two United States arbitrators alone dissented. The arbitrators, having thus disposed of the disputed points, are devoting their time and attention to the question of regulations to be established for the proper protection and preservation of Behring Sea seals. It is said that these regulations will be made very stringent for the preservation of seal life.

A dispatch from London says a bark has arrived at Gravesend from Cherbourg with a case of cholera on board.

A chimney of a house with a sheet iron roof was blown over and crashed through the roof. Nobody was hurt.

Benjamin C. Horsford, 43, a paper hanger employed in Westfield, Mass., late Wednesday night, fired five shots at his wife on the street in a remote part of the city, inflicting injuries from which the doctors think she cannot recover. Horsford was arrested. He says he married Mrs. Horsford three years ago and their wedded life had not been happy. He accuses his wife of unfaithfulness. Two weeks ago she left him and came to Gloucester to live. He followed her here last night, and as a result of an angry interview attempted to take her life. He said he also intended to kill an alleged paramour of his wife. The woman is slowly sinking. Mrs. Horsford's maiden name was McPherson and she was born in Boston, N. S.
An accident resulting in the death of at least 4 persons and injuries to probably 15 or 20 others occurred Thursday evening at the boathouse of the Chelsea Yacht Club, Chelsea. It was illumination night at the clubhouse and a large crowd was in attendance including many ladies. The band was playing on the pier in front of the house and many people filled the balcony directly over the musician's heads. Suddenly the balcony gave way and the occupants thrown upon the pier, many of them in the water. An alarm of fire was sounded and the firemen responded and did excellent service in rescuing those floating in the water and securing the bodies of the drowned. The dead as far as known comprise the leader of the band and two others.
